THERE is a humiliating note in the news on the day this is written.

Ex-Congressman May of Kentucky and the munition-making Garsson brothers are found guilty by a federal jury of using for their own profit May's wartime influence as chairman of the house military committee.

The charge was that the Garssons offered and May took bribes. The purpose of the bribes was to get for the Garssons by political influence government contracts that they didn't seem to be able to get otherwise.

THESE contracts were for munitions of war to be used on the battlefield by men who had given up their private lives and their private liberty to fight for their country. The proceeds of the contracts, presumably, went to enrich men who were staying safely at home.

Therein lies the humiliation.

LET'S not, of course, EXAGGERATE the incident. For every Garsson and May who took easy

Musicians Federation May
Cease Broadcasts on Radio
Networks, Petrillo Asserts

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—James C. Petrillo said today that his American Federation of Musicians may seek to ban radio network broadcasts of music when present contracts expire Dec. 31.

The union president also declared a "present intention" to let all music recording contracts expire at the end of the year. He said the union may decide to make records itself.

Petrillo told a House Labor subcommittee investigating his union's activities that he is "considering a new union policy" against all chain broadcasts. Noting that 933 radio stations now employ no musicians, the union's president said:

"We want to allow these people who are dissatisfied (he referred to the radio networks) to become satisfied. If they want to broadcast

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Coal Strike Looms as Peace Agreement Bogs Down

Lewis Balks
At Suit Clause
In Labor Law

At Least 60 Per Cent of
Miners May Refuse to
Resume Work Tuesday

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—A strike of at least 60 per cent of the nation's 400,000 soft coal miners appears inevitable tomorrow as the wage pact which was to lead the way to peace in the bituminous fields bogged down in last-minute legal tangles.

The other 40 per cent of the industry may also be strike-bound Tuesday, when the miners' today vacation is due to end, if the race to complete a contract for the Northern and Steel Company "captive" mines is lost.

A tentative agreement on general terms was reached last Wednesday but this contract must be completed before: (a) coal mine owners of the south, midwest and far west can determine whether they want to or can buy peace at the same price; (b) John L. Lewis will even talk about an agreement with anyone else.

The legal snarl therefore was not only delaying the Northern-Steel Company settlement perilously near the strike deadline, but it had all but wiped out any hope of getting agreements for the remainder of the industry in time to bring the miners from other areas back into the pits by the first shifts at midnight tonight. The "captive" mines produce coal only for steel making.

Mystery of 'Flying Saucers,'
Seen in 39th State, Also in
South 2 Years Ago, Unsolved

(By the Associated Press.)

The mystery of the "flying saucers," those whirling, disc-like objects sailing through the air at terrific speed, remained unsolved today as reports were received that they were observed in the 39th state—Massachusetts.

Thirty-eight states, the District of Columbia and Canada previously listed the phenomenon since the saucers first were reported sighted June 25.

Strange Objects
In Sky Observed
From Roseburg

Objects in the sky that might have been flying discs—two observers who saw them hesitated to say—were reported over Roseburg Saturday afternoon.

Edwin S. Woodford, a local surveyor, said he saw a round, silvery object high in the sky over his home at Camp View about 1 o'clock, just as he had finished lunch and was preparing to return to work.

He described it as "very bright and silvery." He saw its reflection and called his wife's attention to it. They kept it in view for five or 10 minutes, he said.

The round object apparently was drifting toward the south-east, being carried along by a northwesterly wind. Before the object disappeared, Woodford said he tried to pick it up with his transit, but failed.

Chief of Police O. A. Kennerly said he was standing on the city hall steps Saturday afternoon watching the sky, as everyone seems to be doing now. Two black objects, which made no sound and traveled "very fast," appeared from behind a cloud and disappeared again almost immediately.

The chief would not say what he thought they were. He watched for them to reappear from behind the clouds, but they failed to do so. Far to the west, the objects might have been airplanes, he said.

Coos Man Killed
As Autos Collide

CRESCENT JUNCTION, Utah, July 7.—(AP)—George H. Treanor, 34, Bay, Ore., was killed and two persons were seriously injured yesterday in the collision of two automobiles at the junction of U. S. highways 50 and 160.

Mrs. Ida Treanor, his wife, suffered cuts, bruises and severe shock and Mrs. Bertha Reis, incurred burns of the lower legs.

Highway patrolman William S. Lines said a car driven by Treanor struck the rear of a car driven by William Reis of Bend, Ill., husband of the injured woman, which had stopped to permit Reis to read a road sign.

Mrs. Reis was burned in escaping from her husband's car, which burst into flames after the collision. Lines said Treanor was thrown through the windshield of his car into the flames, and died of injuries and burns before workmen nearby could rescue him.

Spain Votes Franco Right
To Name His Successor

MADRID, July 7.—(AP)—Unofficial returns indicated today that Spanish voters had ratified yesterday by a margin of approximately 10 to one a law confirming Generalissimo Francisco Franco as chief of state and giving him the right to propose his successor, who would become regent.

Results tabulated by the Associated Press from 12,018 out of 23,242 polling places showed 5,664,904 affirmative votes to 350,477 opposed and 195,855 blank. Approximately 16,185,000 persons were eligible to vote in the elections—the first to be held in Spain in 11 years.

Franco had permitted no organized campaign by the opposition, which was expected to register its strength by staying away from the polling places or by casting blank ballots.

Snell Endorses Aspirant
For War Veterans Post

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—Governor Snell said today he has endorsed the candidacy of Harry E. Williams, Portland, for junior vice commander-in-chief of the United Spanish War Veterans.

Williams is being sponsored by the Oregon Department at the national convention to be held in Kansas City, Mo., August 24.

Oregon never has had a national commander of the organization, the governor said.

Dewey Given
Vote Pledges
In Southwest

SAPULPA, Okla., July 7.—(AP)—A showdown fight between Gov. Thomas E. Dewey and Sen. Robert A. Taft for support of the Texas delegation in their race for the Republican presidential nomination appeared in the making today.

George Hopkins of Dallas, Texas Republican state chairman, and William C. Briggs, chairman of the local committee of Paducah, Tex., conferred with the New York governor for more than an hour here.

Their visit was not disclosed until they had started back to Texas.

A Dewey aide said Hopkins and Briggs had driven more than 300 miles from the Lone Star state to "pay their respects" to the governor.

Forty Votes at Stake

But political observers, aware that Taft forces reportedly believed the bulk of the Texas delegation will support the Ohio senator at the national convention next June, saw in the visit an attempt by Dewey backers to cut into Taft there.

Texas has 40 votes.

Dewey scheduled conferences today with Lew Wentz, Republican national committeeman from Oklahoma, and executives of several Oklahoma newspapers.

The governor received weekend predictions from midwestern and southwestern Republican leaders that he would get an overwhelming majority of the convention delegates from their sections.

Wentz, who saw the governor Sunday, predicted that most of Oklahoma's 20 convention votes would be cast for Dewey.

Hearing Opens On
Phone Rates Boost

SALEM, July 7.—(AP)—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company opened its fight for higher Oregon rates today at a hearing before Public Utilities Commissioner Flagg.

Flagg will spend most of this week hearing the company say why it needs \$2,249,000 more in annual rates. Then there will be an indefinite recess, after which the opponents will be heard.

Most of the opening testimony will deal with the financial structure of the company and its relationship to the American Telephone and Telegraph Co.

The company contends it is entitled to higher rates because of increased costs and increased population. It is seeking similar increases in California and Washington.

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Weekend Holiday
Costs U. S. More
Than 500 Lives

(By the Associated Press)
More than 500 persons died of highway traffic and other mishaps during the nation's three-day weekend observance of Independence Day.

From 6 P.M., Thursday until Sunday midnight there were 248 reported deaths in automobile accidents, 160 drownings, five in fireworks explosions, and 103 from miscellaneous causes, a total of 516.

California had the highest number of fatalities with 38. New York and Pennsylvania had 36 each.

The traffic toll was well under the total of 275 expected by the National Safety Council, but it was higher than for the same period last year when 241 deaths were reported. The world record was in 1941 when 628 persons were killed during the July 4th celebration.

The House Rules Committee kept the new income tax reduction bill on its fast timetable today, sending it to the House floor for two hours of debate and expected passage tomorrow.

The bill, proposing income tax cuts ranging from 10.5 to 30 per cent starting next January 1, is identical, except for the effective date, to one vetoed last month by President Truman. The effective date of the vetoed bill would have been July 1, 1947.

The rules committee ordered that no amendments except those sponsored by the ways and means committee, which drafted the bill, shall be considered. The ways and means group has some clarifying and corrective changes to propose.

The House Republican leadership, confident it can override another veto, has scheduled the bill for passage tomorrow. The Senate also plans early action, possibly by the weekend.

Chairman Knutson of the Ways and Means Committee told the rules group that enactment of the legislation would not interfere with Republican plans to cut the national debt next year. The total reduction in taxes during the six months starting January 1, Knutson said, will be approximately \$1,700,000,000, which would leave \$5,000,000,000 for debt retirement if anticipated revenue and spending calculations are accurate.

"The only way you can keep your revenues up," Knutson said, "is to encourage people, to give them an incentive."

Knutson declined to hazard a guess as to what the President would do if the new bill reaches him, but said "I certainly think he should sign it."

"I don't think he will sign it, but I think both houses of congress will override a veto," commented Rep. Cox (D-Ga.), a rules committee member.

PARIS, July 7.—(AP)—The French foreign ministry announced today that six nations had accepted the Anglo-French invitation to cooperate in continental economic reconstruction under the Marshall proposal and that similar notes were expected soon from eight other countries.

The six acceptances were from Belgium, Italy, Portugal, Eire, Greece and Turkey.

An acceptance "in principle" have been received unofficially from Holland, Luxembourg, Austria, Iceland, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland.

French quarters said that thus far only one nation, Finland, had given a provisional negative reply, and that this was "for political and geographical reasons."

Czechoslovakia's touchstone of the Slav bloc's attitude, reserved her decision on the Marshall proposal as a Czechoslovak delegation continued conferences in Moscow.

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The decision was taken on the eve of the delayed departure to Moscow of Communist Premier Gottwald and Foreign Minister Masaryk—without waiting for results of their talks with Russian Foreign Minister Molotov, the informants said.

Quinn Warren, 31, of Reedport was fined \$100 and sentenced to six months in the county jail by Justice of the Peace Fred M. Wright on the charge of vagrancy involving creating a disturbance in a riotous manner, using abusive and obscene language and assault and battery.

Neuner Spikes Plan
For Faculty Homes

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—The state board of higher education's plans to build homes for faculty members on land owned by Oregon State College struck a snag today when Attorney General Neuner held the plan illegal.

The plan was for a finance company to supply prefabricated houses, and advance 90 per cent of the cost through a Reconstruction Finance Corporation loan. The land would serve as the other 10 per cent of the cost.

To make the deal, the board would have to deed the land to the finance company, and then buy back the land with the houses on it.

Neuner ruled that the board does not have authority to deed land to any private concern.

The attorney general ruled for the State Civil Service Commission that state employees get one day's annual vacation for each month that has been worked.

He also upheld the public employees' retirement board's rejection of a request by the city of Portland for allowance of prior service credit for time served in World War I.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—President Truman today signed legislation creating a 12-member commission to investigate all agencies of the government with a view of promoting "economy, efficiency and improved service."

Four of the commission members will be appointed by the president, four by the speaker of the House and four by the president of the Senate.

ARCHERY TITLES WON

PORTLAND, July 7.—(AP)—Gene Warnick, Portland, and Marjorie Hoagland, Grants Pass, won the men's and women's titles in the 21st annual Oregon Archery Association tournament here yesterday.

Warnick's total of 1868 was followed by Everett Hoagland, Grants Pass, who scored 1861. Mrs. Hoagland's score was 1458.

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Revived Tax
Reduction Bill
Sent to House

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Emergency
Act Requested
Of Congress

'Plain Duty' of U. S. to
Aid Persecuted People,
Assertion of Message

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—President Truman today asked Congress to admit a "substantial number" of Europe's displaced persons into the United States as immigrants.

In a message, Mr. Truman told Congress "special legislation limited to this particular emergency" would be necessary if the United States is to share in offering "an opportunity for a new life to these people."

The president said Congress would be dealing solely with an emergency problem growing out of the war—the disposition of a specific group of individuals, victims of war who have come into the hands of our own and the other western allies' armies of occupation in Europe.

Since the end of the war, Mr. Truman said, the armies of occupation have been able to return to their homes approximately 7,000,000 people. He added:

"But there still remain in the western zones of Germany and Austria and in Italy close to a million survivors who are unwilling by reason of political opinion and fear of persecution to return to the areas where they once had homes."

"The great majority come from the northern Baltic areas, Poland, the Russian Ukraine and Yugoslavia."

Quotas Not Adequate

Saying that countries in western Europe and Latin America have opened their doors to substantial numbers of these people he told Congress:

"Our plain duty requires that we join with other nations in solving this problem."

"We ourselves should admit a

Bargaining Rights
Lost by Foremen

DETROIT, July 7.—(AP)—Some 3,000 Ford Motor Co. foremen returned to their jobs today after voting to end a 47-day strike that saw loss of their union's bargaining rights.

Nearly 3,800 members of the Foreman's Association of America (Ind.) in Ford's Detroit area Rouge, Lincoln and Highland Park plants walked out May 21 in a dispute over a new contract, demanding exclusive bargaining rights for company foremen.

In recent weeks, however, many of them left their posts in picket lines to return to work. Company and union officials agreed the number reached about 800.

Two other factors were believed instrumental in leading to the back-to-work vote.

Passage of the Taft-Hartley law, which among other things relieves employers of any obligation to bargain with foremen's unions, and the company's subsequent withdrawal of recognition from the FAA.

Failure to get supporting action from the CIO United Auto Workers. Several weeks after the vote the FAA asked the UAW-CIO to authorize its 35,000 members on production lines at the three plants to refuse to cross the foremen's picket lines. The auto workers' executive board sought to intervene as mediator in the strike and when the company rejected the offer the board promised a decision next Wednesday on the FAA request.

Two Youths in Stolen
Automobile Held Here

Two youths in an automobile reported stolen at Jacksonville, Fla., May 25, were arrested here last night, together with a girl companion, Sgt. Lyle Harrell of the state police reported. He gave their names as Jack Floyd Coleman, 22, and Everett Lewis Ash, Jr., 21, both of Jacksonville, and Wanda Gene Pierce, the girl of Cave Junction, Ore. The youths and the girl were each sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and fined \$100 and costs on vagrancy charges, by Justice of the Peace Nina W. Pietzold at Canyonville. In addition, Ash was fined \$10 for no registration card.

Madame Lupescu Given
Chance for Recovery

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, July 7.—(AP)—Mme. Undera, wife of the secretary of former King Carol of Romania, said today Elena Lupescu "passed the crisis" of her grave illness last night and "we even hope that the improvement she shows will lead to her recovery."

The woman sought Thursday to legally in marriage her 23-year-old relationship with the former monarch, who twice has retired hastily from the troubled Romanian throne. She has undergone four transfusions for anemia.
