WHILE we're at it, let's not overlook another lesson of the Jarsson-May affair.

Many people who call themselves "liberals," but who rattle sadly in their bearings, contend that private business is basically "rooted" whereas GOVERNMENT business is lily-white pure.

Well, this Jarsson-May stuff was government stuff. Your history books will tell you, if you read them carefully enough, that down through the centuries government business has been far rootier than private business.

There is also an ENCOURAGING note in the news. The city of Vicksburg is this year observing July 4 as Independence Day for the third time in its history.

There is one thing that is as plain as the nose on your face, it is this: With the world situation what it is, we have neither room nor time in this country any longer to nurse ancient grievances among ourselves.

THE world picture is SHARPENING rapidly following Russia's refusal to participate in the restoration of Western Europe.

At Lake Success (in New York) Britain lines up solidly with us and tells the United Nations delegates that if they can't settle the Balkans trouble as recommended by the United States they might as well "tear up the U. N. charter, pack up their grips and go home."

That's putting it in words of one syllable. Britain has been wobbling a little here of late. Left-wingers in her labor party have been showing a strong tendency to flirt with Russia.

Russia's refusal to help in the rebuilding of Europe (preferring, obviously, continued chaos, which breeds communism) has SOBERED the English.

FRANCE, moving promptly after Russia's rebuff, is preparing to invite 22 European nations to a meeting on July 12 to discuss the Marshall ("get to work and we'll help FINANCE you") program.

ALLOW A FAIR TRIAL

When the committee meets to again revise budget figures for the City of Roseburg, following cancellation of the election, which had been scheduled for tomorrow, because of a clerical error in the legal notice given for publication, it is our personal opinion it should restore some of the funds lopped from the original appropriation for the office of city manager.

Even though the budget is left at \$5,000, as proposed in the revised budget, it will cost approximately \$1,000 to buy filing cabinets, ledgers, office furniture, and office supplies, if the department is to be set up efficiently.

The city manager should have a substantial sum for travel expense.

The department should have at least \$1,500 and preferably more for engineering, research and planning. The city manager will be working in close contact with the newly appointed and organized city planning commission.

We realize that many Roseburg residents are not yet "sold" on the city manager program. The charter amendment setting up the new form of government was approved last fall by only a small majority.

The city manager, however, HAS been authorized. The city council under provisions of the charter amendment has authority to levy up to 2 1/2 mills to finance the department.

Necessity for further revision of our city budget affords an opportunity to correct what we believe was a grievous error in cutting the city manager fund in half.

As to the error which forced cancellation of the election, residents should not, in our opinion, be too critical. It was a case of "haste makes waste."

It is our opinion that the budget committee should seize upon this opportunity to correct another error, that of too excessive cuts in the city manager department.

U. S. Food Exports For Relief Post All-Time Record

WASHINGTON, July 7.—(AP)—President Truman reported Saturday that U. S. exports of food to the world's hungry set an all-time record in the past 12 months, and he promised continued American aid.

He indicated in a statement, however, that future assistance will have to be reduced if corn and other summer-grown grain crops are short.

The president said the United States exported 18,433,000 long tons or about 41,275,000,000 pounds during the year ending June 30.

The old record of 17,122,000 tons was set by the United States a year ago. While calling attention to the United States contribution to "human needs abroad," Mr. Truman said "we must not lose sight of the fact that even the great efforts of this and other exporting countries fell short of meeting urgent post-war needs for food."

Both Mr. Truman and the committee carefully refrained from making definite export commitments beyond August. The government already has made grain export allocations for July and August calling for shipments at recent high levels.

The committee report said it is possible to continue large grain exports during these months because of prospects of a record-breaking wheat crop.
