

Major Leagues' All-Star Teams For Classic Named

CHICAGO, July 7.—(AP)—Cincinnati's Ewell Blackwell and the New York Yankees' Spud Chandler will be the starting pitchers in tomorrow's major league all-star game at Wrigley Field, the managers of the respective National and American League clubs announced today.

Both pilots, Eddie Dyer of the St. Louis Cardinals and Joe Ciminelli of the Boston Red Sox, adhered to sentiment in the fan all-star poll in designating their starting lineups.

The two teams will line up for tomorrow's 14th annual mid-summer classic as follows:

Coal Strike Looms in Stalemate of Parley

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against any future strikes under the Taft-Hartley labor law, and that the industry representatives working on the Northern-Steel pact had balked.

Because the new act would permit the coal companies to sue the United Mine Workers for any breach of contract, Lewis is said to have insisted on a provision stating the miners need work only when they are "willing and able."

What Pact Provides

Otherwise the tentative agreement negotiated by Benjamin F. Fairless, president of the U. S. Steel Corporation, and George M. Humphrey, chairman of the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Company, is reported to contain these general terms:

1. The daily pay for an inside day miner is set at \$13.05 for eight hours underground, with no premium pay for portal-to-portal travel but with the basic hourly rate hiked from \$1.18 to \$1.63. The miner actually would work only six and one-half hours. Thirty minutes would be allowed for lunch and one hour to get to and from the mine opening underground. This worker got \$11.85 for a nine-hour day under the government contract which expired when the federally-seized pits were returned to private ownership last Monday.

2. Inclusion of the federal mine safety code in the contract, superseding the hodge-podge of state laws.

3. Boosting of the controversial tonnage royalty for the miners' welfare fund from five to ten cents.

At the latter figure, the fund would get more than \$50,000,000 a year if accepted by the entire industry.

Strike Halts Record Peacetime Ship Work

MOBILE, Ala., July 7.—(AP)—Alabama Dry Dock & Shipbuilding Co., working 4,000 employees on a record peacetime ship repair and conversion program, was shut down today by a strike of CIO shipyard workers.

The big Pinto Island yard, closed over the long holiday weekend, failed to open this morning. Hundreds of pickets patrolled the three entrances to the yards. Police cars cruised along the waterfront but no disorders were reported.

Jewish-Born Christian Minister to Speak



An account of his conversion to Christianity will be given by the Rev. Elias Zimmerman, above, at the First Christian Church, E. Douglas and Kane Sts., at 8 o'clock tomorrow night. Formerly of Soviet Russia, where he attended a number of famous rabbinical schools in preparation for his life as a Jewish rabbi, the Rev. Mr. Zimmerman will speak on "How a Rabbinical Student Found Christ in Soviet Russia."

In a remarkable manner he was led to embrace Christianity and because of his conversion was compelled to leave Russia and later, Germany and to come to America.

After graduating from a leading theological seminary in the United States, he became pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Smyrna, Ga.

He is now one of the field representatives of the American Board of the Mission to the Jews of Brooklyn, N. Y., which is the largest such mission and located in the midst of 2,000,000 Jews.

The public is invited to hear the Rev. Mr. Zimmerman. In addition to his appearance at the First Christian Church in Roseburg, he will speak at the Christian Church in Oakland, Wednesday night.

Flying Saucers Mystery Still Lacks Solution

The guard planned to send a plane today to a spot near St. Maries, Idaho, where a woman said 10 persons saw eight of the disks disappear in timber on July 3.

Most observers usually agreed that the objects were round or oval. Guesses as to their size have ranged from that of a five-room house or large airplane to one description of "a silver ball, six inches in diameter."

The army, the navy and the atomic energy commission all disclaimed any connection with the mystery. An army air forces spokesman in Washington said the AAF had been checking the reports but added that we still haven't the slightest idea what they could be.

Some scientists suggested that reflections of light, such as from aircraft, might account for the bright objects which have been reported. In some cases, the observers have insisted that the "saucers" have been accompanied by sound.

TACOMA, July 7.—(AP)—Two Tacoma prowler officers reported today that they had seen "six or seven" flying saucers silhouet-

ted under a bright moon in the southern sky at 2:30 A. M. while they were patrolling the city.

The pair, Stan Johnson and Evan Davies, said a central saucer appeared to act as a sort of flagship, appearing either to be larger or closer than the other. Toward it, they reported, the other disks would fly, then race southward. Davies said the larger disk seemed a shade of red part of the time, but "most of the time was a sort of luminous silver."

Eventually, he said, all of the

disks sped westward at terrific speed toward the Olympic mountains.

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
