

Chiefs Win Over Milt Loggers, 6-3

Big Bill Stradley hurled the Umpqua Chiefs to a 6-3 victory over a tubborn Milt Loggers, nine yesterday at Finlay Field before a stand full of fans.

It was Roseburg's fifth win in seven starts, having lost Friday to Central Point 4-1 and 10-9 to Grants Pass in an earlier conference fray. For Milt, the loss gave them a standing of 3 and 3.

The Chiefs won the Southern Oregon League contest with a two-run uprising in the fourth, putting together two doubles and a single, and added an extra marker in the fifth to account for the three-run victory margin.

Left-hander Cummings was the losing pitcher after being replaced by Hostolot in the seventh. Dick DeBernardi started on the Roseburg mound, and was replaced in the second by Roy Long, who gave way to Stradley because of a stiff neck.

Roseburg scored its first run in the opening stanza as Lovell Baker singled, advanced on George Sanders' sacrifice and reached home when Jerry Huggins slammed the ball into the left centerfield fence for a triple.

Hill scored twice in the third off a double and two singles, but in Roseburg's side of the frame Lovell Baker again singled, Sanders repeated his sacrifice, and Vonnie Baker scored his brother on a centerfield drive. Vonnie then came home off a clean single by Elmore Hill.

DeBernardi, centerfield, opened the hitting in the fourth with two down, with a long double and was followed by Lovell Baker's double. A single by George Sanders scored Baker.

In the fifth Huggins singled and scored off a Chinese double by Hill to clinch a Chief victory, although the California Loggers staged a desperate rally in the ninth with two down. Baker made a bad toss to first to put Marin on base. McNeil singled and a wild pitch scored Marin.

A walk by Stradley threatened to prolong the contest but a fielder's choice putout to second ended the game.

Left-hander Lovell Baker led afternoon's hitters with three for four, getting a double and two singles and a fielder's choice, accounting for two runs and scoring himself three times.

Considerable crowd and player dissension held fans' interest until the game's final out as Don True, Hill third-sacker, slid into second in the eighth frame to be put out and receive a slightly bruised leg. As time was called and he limped to the bench, George Sanders went to his side to offer aid and was welcomed with a swinging fist.

True leads the Southern Oregon League in home runs with a total of five, for a season's batting percentage of .471. He last week reported to the Los Angeles Angels of the Coast

League for a try-out and was recently released from a try-out at the New York Yankee's school at Medford.

Wednesday at 5 P. M., the Chiefs meet the San Diego Negro Tigers on Finlay Field in an exhibition contest and next Sunday they play host to Tri-City in a return league contest.

As well as playing topflight ball, the dusky team will feature a proper game, warm-up stunts, and various comical actions combined with incessant chatter and an exhibition of ghost ball.

The red hot New York Yankees are riding an eight-game winning streak today and enjoy an eight game margin over Detroit and Boston in the American League flag chase.

Parks Keeps Title By Tossing Szasz In Three-Fall Bout

Going the limit on his repertoire of cavemen tactics and frequently seeking refuge in the ropes to escape punishing holds, while the fans jeered him continuously, Herb Parks defeated Al Szasz at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night and thereby retained his dubious title of junior light - heavyweight champion wrestler of the Pacific Northwest.

The combat went three falls. The first was captured by Szasz in 19:13 with a trio of whip wristlocks and a long arm bar. Parks took the next two in the respective periods of 5:27 and 6:45, each with a toe hold and stomp. In the final round, Parks hurled

Szasz through the ropes onto the floor, then followed him up, but was prevented by Referee Elton Owen from inflicting further punishment there on his foe. Unpunished to the mat, however, Parks slipped past the referee and kicked Szasz back onto the floor as he started to climb through the ropes. Al ultimately got back into the fray, caught Parks in another whip wristlock, but the hold slipped on the first toss and the titleholder then gradually wore down the challenger and forced him to concede defeat.

The card opener, between Pierre LaBelle and Jack Carter, was also a three-fall affair, LaBelle taking the first and third in 11:43 and 3:45, respectively. A Hungarian leg clutch forced Carter to yield in the first round, and a series of drop kicks, followed by a press, finished him in the final. He took the second fall of the bout in 11:05 with a combination toe and jack-knife hold.

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
