Creek Near Drain Named In Honor of War Hero

Naming of a creek near Drain was the only name change in Oregon contained in the recommendation of the Federal Division of Geography issued in Washington, D. C., this week.

The new name of the 250-yard long stream, flowing eastward into Pheasant Creek in Douglas County near the Lane county line, is to be known as Seeley Creek in honor of Seeley Douglas Martin, who was killed during World War II.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest J. Martin, then residents of Long Beach, Calif., he was killed May 23, 1942, while performing duty with the U. S. Navy. He was 18 years of age, the preceding January.

Later the parents moved to their present home in Douglas County on the Loran Route, Cottage Grove, property through which the creek flows. Request for naming the creek was made to the Oregon Geographic Board by Mrs. Martin.

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Oregon Airport Directory Issued

Publication of the Oregon Airport Directory for 1947 is announced by the Oregon State Board of Aeronautics. The directory, compiled "in the interest of aviation development," lists detailed information concerning location of each airport with relation to the nearest community, direction, area and surface of each runway, facilities available, etc. The directory also makes note of interesting facts concerning each locality, particularly noting hunting and fishing areas. Appendix to port information at Roseburg mentions "county seat; North and South Umpqua rivers, fishing and hunting; U. S. Veterans' hospital; home of Oregon's first territorial governor, Joseph Lane. A large detailed aviation map is folded into the new directory.
