WASHINGTON, July 9. — (AP) — The House public lands committee today approved a bill to provide for payments of \$500 each to members of the Klamath Indian tribe in Oregon.

They would be made from a \$2,298,000 tribal fund.

The bill originally called for \$1,000 payments but the committee cut this in half.

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Laity Aid Needed To Spread Gospel, Minister Declares

TACOMA, July 10. — (AP) — Protestantism is "pretty much preacher ridden," the Rev. Dudley Strain of Salem, Ore., told the Washington Christian Missionary Society here, and must begin to enlist laymen in spreading its message.

The Oregon minister, speaking at the 15th annual convention of the society, declared that "the major responsibility and opportunity confronting the church just now is to enlist Christian laymen to make the Gospel of Jesus Christ effective in the areas where they live and serve."

"Protestantism is pretty much preacher ridden," he continued. "When Protestantism speaks, the language, the voice and the meaning is that of ministers, not laymen. When life is seen in the light of the divine vocation, the areas where they live and serve, two mutually exclusive realms of concern. The minister is not a specialist in Christianity. His is a service to Christ and men, differing only in degree and not in kind from other services which Christians render."

"The areas where this new age must win its victories are where you laymen live and move—in politics, in business, in finance, in labor unions, in industry, in the professions, in the schools, in community service, in the church where ministers come and go."

Camp White Hospital Take-Over to be Asked

PORTLAND, July 9. — (AP) — Petitions designed to force the state board of control to take over and operate the Camp White Hospital as a state hospital will be circulated this week, State Sen. Lew Wallace said.

Wallace said the petitions, calling for an initiative vote, are now at the printers.

Demand for Better Class Lumber Holding Firm

WASHINGTON, July 10. — (AP) — The Commerce Department reported yesterday that demand and prices for better grades of lumber are holding firm, but buyer resistance and improved supplies have reduced both prices and sales volume for the lower grades.

Many small mills which produced only rough green or ungraded lumber have shut down or shifted production from lumber to ties because of declining prices, the department said.

It added that this "may result in a considerable downward revision of earlier estimates of total output in 1947," and reduce substantially the first quarter production rate of 36,000,000 board feet for this year.

Alaska Almost 'Broke', Treasurer Announces

JUNEAU, Alaska, July 10. — (AP) — Territorial Treasurer Oscar Olson said yesterday Alaska is nearly "broke," with the bank balance to pay general government operations down to about \$20,000.

He said he would decline to pay any more warrants until more money is available. Most of the territory's large tax revenues for the year have already been collected.

The territorial board of administration is expected to make a statement within the next few days.
