WOOD WASTE PROBLEMS

Fifty-seven per cent of wood cut in a forest is wasted or burned for fuel, according to a survey published by the U. S. Forest Service in a report, Wood Waste in the United States, fourth of a series being published by the service on its 1945-46 nationwide reappraisal of the forest situation.

Under present conditions, says the report, "68 per cent of the cubic volume of trees cut for lumber is wasted, 66 per cent in the case of veneer, 70 per cent for hewed railroad ties, and 72 per cent for kegs, casks and barrels."

Primary manufacture, the conversion of logs into lumber, pulp, paper, veneer, ties, etc., showed waste amounting to 49 per cent of the 108,900,000 tons total. This followed logging waste, placed at 49,000,000 tons, or 45 per cent.

Five suggestions are contained in the report: (1) Greater integration of timber products industries, for example, sawmills with paper and pulp mills; (2) extension of sustained yield forest management; (3) research to find ways of making old products with less waste or to devise new ways of utilizing wood waste;

A public hearing has been set in Roseburg for the date of July 21, at which time there will be a discussion of proposed sustained yield forest management policies for this area. Arguments will be presented at that hearing, we presume, to the effect that the sustained yield program will result in a virtual monopoly by large and well-financed concerns, while the small, independent operator, will be crowded out of the industry.

Unless small operators change their operating policies, we fear the argument is sound. There is not sufficient timber to maintain all operations as presently organized. If, on the other hand, we can secure at least partial utilization of the 57 per cent of wasted wood, we can increase employment and income within the industry, without increasing allowable cut.

The small operator can prevent his own elimination by uniting forces with similar operators, pooling resources, setting up cooperative sustained yield units, and sponsoring utilization of waste. The sight of a sawmill burning tons upon tons of wood daily on an open pile or in a refuse burner should be banished. Public interest demands fullest utilization of our resource.

At present a great many small mills are shut down because of a market slump. But if they had subsidiary operations they could be taking profits from pulp, veneer, ties, crossarms, chemicals, or even blackstrap molasses, though they had no market for rough-cut lumber.

Continuation of practices which waste 57 per cent of a rapidly dwindling resource should no longer be tolerated.

New Agriculture Laws of Oregon Now Effective

By PAUL W. HARVEY, JR., SALEM, July 10. (AP)—New agriculture laws, covering everything from cattle to filberts and including important changes in brand inspection, Bang's disease and livestock market regulations, became effective this week, 90 days after the end of the 1947 legislative session.

One of the most important creates a livestock auction market board with power to make regulations to keep these markets sanitary and prevent them from selling diseased animals. The livestock market business is growing rapidly. A new one opened in eastern Oregon a few days ago, and the Agriculture Department said it did \$200,000 worth of business the first day.

Enforcement of the law will be financed by a license fee of \$100 per year for each market. Penalties range up to \$500 fine and 30 days in jail. There also is a similar new law affecting livestock dealers who handle animals for resale. Must Kill Diseased Cattle. Retention of cattle with Bang's disease will not be allowed after November 1, after which they must be slaughtered and the indemnity will be paid.

The new brand inspection law, forcing brand inspection of livestock markets and compelling certificates of ownership to be carried while animals are being transported, is aimed at preventing livestock theft. Here is what the other new laws do:

Regulates cold storage locker plants and fixes sanitary standards for them, as well as temperatures to be maintained; brings egg standards to conform with federal grades; gives department of agriculture power to seize illegal insecticides and fungicides; brings walnut and filbert grading in line with other states; taxes nurserymen for research work; increases apitary fee to \$1 for each apiarist plus 15 cents for each beehive; authorizes the state to buy part of an acre to be added to the state fairgrounds, enabling parking of 1,500 more cars.

Jobs will be available for 33,000 persons in the Willamette Valley bean harvest which begins next week. . . . But 350 Mexicans who have been working in the Malheur county sugar beet fields have been sent to other states because there isn't enough work for them in Oregon. . . . Fair prices as a whole were unchanged in June, with lower prices in hops, wheat, oats and butterfat being offset by higher beef, lamb, egg and barley prices. . . . Home gardeners are advised by the OSC extension service to use ordinary dust on their plants if they can't buy chemical dust preparations.
