## 'Flying Saucers' Seen By Father Coughlan

Fr. William Coughlan, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, reported sighting three "flying saucers" about 2 P.M. Tuesday, July 8, while flying a twin-engine plane. Watching about 8,000 feet, Fr. Coughlan's gaze was attracted by bright metallic flashes behind and above the plane. "They appeared definitely circular and seemed to be giggling and darting about," he said. The flashes were "awfully bright" and were obviously from a "metallic object." He watched them for an estimated 15 seconds, then looked for an observer to whom he could point them out. But no one was near. They seemed to disappear, he said, apparently having passed out of the area in which they reflected light to his eyes.

## Sustained Yield Plan Clarified by M'Daniel Booklet

The pride we all feel in the amazing development of the lumber business in Douglas County, and for that matter, in all of Western Oregon, should not be confined to the lumber business. When the lumber business booms, so does almost every other business in the area. It means prosperity for the grocer, the service station man, the beauty parlor, the druggists, hardware men and all the rest. It makes a live city. But back in the dark corners of some of our minds lurks a fear that we do not like to think of. We cannot forget certain ghost towns that once were booming mill cities, but where half the stores now are vacant, the mills closed, and most of the population departed—because all the timber of the region has been cut off and is gone. Will that happen here?

The answer is no, because of that more or less misunderstood government policy called sustained yield. So relax, and cheer up!

**Explanation Via Argument**  
Everett H. MacDaniels well known in Roseburg as a former member of the local Forest Service staff, is the author of a 16-page illustrated booklet called "The Trees and You," on timber growing and sustained yield, what it is and what it means to you and me. He has given the most reassuring and convincing explanation of sustained yield that has ever been published for our citizens. And this is how he does it:

MacDaniels, in imagination, lets us sit in with a little group of menfolk around the stove in the corner grocery. There are the logger, the country grocer, the forester, the banker, the farmer, the county judge and the sawmill man. This is the way it starts:

"The night was colder than the ice on a buffalo's whiskers. There was not much room around the stove in the corner grocery. The argument going on was hotter than the stove."

"Logger: You swivel chair barksteers are always thinking up some funny ideas. What do you mean by 'sustained yield' anyhow?"

"Forester: That's easy. Trees grow out of the ground, same as any other crop. You can't harvest more than you raise, so if you want to get along, you'd better raise plenty."

"Logger: Think I'm going to plant a tree and stick around here eighty years until it's sawlog size? My name is Flynn, not Methusalem!"

**Forester Wins Out**  
The Frank answers of the forester to those who doubted the practicability of sustained yield, and his technical explanations won out. And the information that the main object of sustained yield was to ensure permanent prosperity of the community, not the boom-and-bust tragedy of the ghost town, with the further news that this government policy was being put into operation in a big way right now, left the group around the stove enthusiastically for sustained yield.

Mr. MacDaniels, the author of this little booklet—which is large for its size—came into the Forest Service here in 1939, when S. C. Bartrum was supervisor. He later served as deputy supervisor at Medford, and supervisor of Chelan National Forest, and in 1920 of the Siskiyou Forest. He has been active in conservation work

and as a writer on forest problems.

MacDaniels is a brother-in-law of Mrs. Walter Hamilton of Roseburg. He has visited Roseburg often, and many of his friends will remember the time when Everett MacDaniels walked all the way from Klamath Falls to Medford in two days, arriving in Medford in time to mow his lawn before settling down to rest! Fabulous, but true!
