'Cruelty' Charge**Decriing the exhibition of bull-  
dogging and roping and tying  
events at the recent Sheriff's  
Posse Rodeo as a "disgrace to  
either of the so-called sports," the  
writer of a letter to a Portland  
newspaper this week said she was  
not an advocate of the "cruel,  
barbaric kind of sport that I  
saw at Roseburg recently."The letter was written by Mrs.  
O. E. Henderson of Eagle Point,  
Ore., who urged the abolition of  
the "wanton cruelty to the de-  
fenseless dumb animals used in  
rodeos."Commenting on the letter,  
Deputy Sheriff Dick Baker, rodeo  
superintendent, denied that "one  
so-called cowboy, while bulldog-  
ging a steer, and while he had  
him 'foul,' reached down with his  
free hand, got a handful of dirt  
and deliberately poured it in the  
poor dumb brute's eye.""That's strictly against the  
rules of the Rodeo Cowboys As-  
sociation," Baker declared. "There  
are a couple of judges on the  
field at all times to see that  
there's no cruelty to animals.  
That's the way the cowboys make  
their living—playing in the ro-  
deos. If they were caught bog-  
ging the animals, they'd lose  
their eligibility."Mrs. Henderson also asked,  
"Where is our humane society  
that such cruelty should be al-  
lowed? And what are people  
thinking of when they pay to wit-  
ness entertainment (?) that

Roseburg**Conditions, Life  
In Korea Told by  
Red Cross Worker**Impressions of his year in Ko-  
rea with the American Red Cross  
were told to the Roseburg Rotary  
Club yesterday noon by Frank  
Voyt of Roseburg, who served  
throughout the war.  
"Korea was called the Hermit  
Kingdom and the Land of Morn-  
ing Calm," he said. "After our  
boys were there a couple of  
weeks, they called it a great  
many other names, all uncomplimentary."Voyt spent most of his time in  
Seoul, the capital city, which he  
described as a city of 200,000 per-  
sons and without sewage or sani-  
tation. Although the Japanese  
had spent a great amount of  
money in modernizing the central  
part of the city, most of it con-  
sists of mud and huts, which are  
a great fire hazard.  
"I learned that a quarter-block  
fire had displaced 500 persons  
from their homes. You can imagine  
the congestion there," he said.  
He described Korean social life  
as "a man's world—definitely,  
and it always has been." Women  
are not in evidence in hotel din-  
ing rooms or other places of  
amusement and are likely to be  
seen on the streets carrying their  
children piggy-back style."There is a mistaken impres-  
sion about geisha girls in this  
country," Voyt explained. "They  
are of three grades. Those of the  
first grade are well educated,  
highly trained entertainers; those  
of the second grade are trained  
entertainers, but also may be of  
easy virtue; those in the third  
grade are the latter."During the war Voyt served in  
Europe, being sent to Normandy  
soon after the invasion. Follow-  
ing the end of the European war,  
he was assigned to the Far East.  
The Rotary program yesterday  
also included three songs by Bob  
Near, who during the war served
