Weekend Mishaps In Washington Take Eight Lives

Three separate automobile accidents took the lives of seven persons in Washington State over the weekend with four orchard workers dying near Omak, two youths near Port Angeles and a 4-year-old boy at Yakima.

An eighth person, 13-year-old Robert Larsen of Tacoma, drowned in Green River.

Bodies of the four orchard workers were found Saturday strewn along a rocky embankment of the Duck Lake Road two miles from Omak. The dead, all from Sheridan, Ark., were: Kenneth Brashears, 25; Truman Dial, 22; Zep Klesler, 45; and Charles Owens, 23.

A fifth man, Burrell Cooper, 21, also of Sheridan, was thrown clear. He was picked up, unconscious, by a passing motorist and taken to a hospital where he is expected to recover. The accident occurred Saturday night as the men were en route to a dance hall.

At Port Angeles, Sgt. Cliff Aden of the state patrol said two young men were killed outright and a third painfully injured when their car skidded off the Olympic Highway Saturday seven miles west of Port Angeles. The dead youths were Jack Hensley, 21, and Dale Johnson, 18, both of Forks. The third youth, Hugh E. Ford, 23, was extricated from the wreckage and taken to a Port Angeles hospital. His condition was said to be fair.

Harold Rigby, 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Rigby of Granger, was fatally injured Saturday when a truck and automobile collided near Granger. Seven others also were injured.

Yakima was the scene also of another near fatality when Eugene Smith of Everett was critically injured as his stock racing car spun out of control and crashed a fence at the Yakima race track.

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Hunting Seasons Listed by Oregon Game Commission

PORTLAND, July 14. —(AP)—

Tentative hunting season dates posted today by the State Game Commission authorize a concurrent deer and elk season for Southeastern Oregon but specified the elk must be bull animals with three or more point antlers.

The deer season was set for October 1-20 in all but 13 closed areas and the elk season for the section east of The Dalles-California Highway and south of the John Day Highway, between Redmond and Nyssa, was set for October 1-20.

A separate elk season was also tentatively scheduled for the district north of the John Day highway and east of The Dalles-California route for October 25-November 16. The western Oregon elk season in Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln and Lane counties north of the Stuslaw River was set for October 25-November 2 inclusive.

Pheasant season in Eastern and Southeastern Oregon was set for October 22 to November 2. The Willamette valley was again closed to pheasant hunting. The bag limit was set at three cocks a day and not more than six in possession.

The valley quail season for Eastern and Southern Oregon counties was set for the same dates with the bag limit at five a day and ten in possession.

The waterfowl season was scheduled Oct. 22-Nov. 5, inclusive and Dec. 24-Jan. 6 inclusive.

Special Seasons Fixed — The commission also set up these special seasons and regulations, with final action to be taken July 26 on all matters.

Antelope — No open season.

Deer — Bag limit one blacktail or mule deer having at least forked horns.

Closed areas: All of Sherman county, Camas creek area near Ukiah in Umatilla county, Tillamook burn, Siltz area, onion peak area in Clatsop and Tillamook counties, Detroit area in Marion county, Wanaga butte area in Crook county, northwest corner of Ochoco refuge, whitetailed deer refuge in Douglas county, Deschutes game refuge except a portion at the southern end, Mt.

Emily game refuge, mountain sheep refuge.

Archery season for deer, Sept. 23-30 in Cove area of Union county and same portion of Deschutes refuge open last year; Sept. 23-Oct. 20 in same portion of Canyon creek refuge open to archers last year.

Elk — Bag limit, one bull elk with antlers of three points or more.

Special elk seasons — Oct. 1-20 in that part of Deschutes county west of highway 97, Nov. 22-30 inclusive in Baker area with general elk tag to be valid for one elk of either sex, Dec. 13-16 inclusive in Ukiah area with bag limit at one elk of either sex; one hundred permits to be issued, Sept. 20-24 inclusive in Dora area of Coos county with bag limit of one elk of either sex and 50 permits to be issued.

Refuges Opened — Refuges to be open to hunting—Salt Creek, Grass Mountain, Myrtle Park, Steens Mountain, Cow Creek, Mule Deer, Warner game refuge outside the federal Hart Mountain reserve, Ochoco game refuge except the north-east corner, Canyon Creek refuge except portion set aside for archers and that part of Deschutes refuge south of Cabin Lake road.

Pheasants — Oct. 22-Nov. 2 in Douglas, Coos, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Union, Wallowa, Baker, Grant, Harney and Lake except Summer Lake valley to be closed, Oct. 22-Nov. 9, in Malheur county. Summer Lake valley to be open concurrent with waterfowl season.

Valley Quail — Oct. 22-Nov. 2 in Coos, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Baker, Grant, Harney and Lake except Summer Lake valley to be closed, Oct. 22-Nov. 9, in Malheur county. Summer Lake valley to be open concurrent with waterfowl season.

Blue grouse — Sept. 27-Oct. 20 in Josephine, Clatsop, Columbia and counties west of the summit of the coast range. Bag limit of two grouse a day but not more than four in the season.

Mountain quail, Hungarian partridge, ruffed grouse and sage grouse — No open season.

Silver gray squirrels — Sept. 27-Oct. 20 in all counties except Hood River and Wasco. Bag limit of five in possession.

Cottontail and brush rabbits — Nov. 15-Feb. 15. Bag limit of five in possession.

Mink, muskrat, raccoon and otter — Nov. 15-Feb. 15. Closed.

Season entire year on marten, beaver, fisher, ringneck cat.

Band-tailed pigeons — Season to be set by federal government, with bag limit of eight in a day or eight in possession.

Doves — Season and bag limit to be set by federal government except that the following counties will be closed: Lake, Klamath, Deschutes, Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry and Douglas. Areas closed to migratory waterfowl hunting — Coos Bay between coast highway bridge and railroad bridge and pony slough; same portion of Summer Lake management area as last year plus an additional 160 acres under lease; all property of Chewaucan Land and Cattle Company in the upper and lower Chewaucan marshes.

Humane Peace For Japan Urged By MacArthur

TOKYO, July 14. —(AP)— General MacArthur declared yesterday the peace treaty with Japan, "without yielding firmness in its essential mandates," should avoid "punitive, arbitrary and unrealistic provisions," and by its terms set the pattern for future peace throughout the world.

The supreme commander outlined his views on the principles to be embodied in the peace treaty in a statement lauding the Far Eastern commission's policy decision as "one of the great state papers in modern history."

The action by the 11-Pacific Nation Commission, announced yesterday, in effect approved the occupation directive MacArthur received from President Truman Sept. 6, 1945.

MacArthur said the agreement on basic allied policy provides the entire framework for the peace which "we shall win" in Japan. The treaty, he added, "may now be approached with assurance of complete understanding in principle and full unity for purpose in evolving its detail."

No date has been set as yet for the Japanese peace conference. MacArthur has advocated it be held as soon as possible.

Spray Now, Filbert Growers Advised

Filbert growers who plan to spray or dust for the control of the filbert worm should spray or dust immediately. Filbert moths began to emerge on July 10, according to information received at the county agent's office from the OSC experiment station on Saturday. Under ordinary conditions eggs deposited by the filbert moth begin to hatch in about eight days making it advisable to apply a spray or dust before July 18.

Lead arsenate, used at the rate of three pounds to 100 gallons of water, plus a spreader or a 40 per cent lead arsenate dust, is recommended. A thorough application of a spray or dust is essential for control, particularly

on the upper portion of the tree and on the underside of the leaves. The larvae of the moth only feeds on the undersides of the leaves before they enter the nuts.

For growers planning to use dust a 40 per cent lead arsenate dust applied at the rate of 40 to 50 pounds per acre is recommended. Dusting should be done in the early morning hours while atmospheric conditions are calm.

DDT used as a spray or dust has proven satisfactory in controlling filbert worms. The spray is used at the rate of 1 pound of actual DDT to 100 gallons of water, using 2 pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT to each 100 gallons of water. A five per cent dust may be used at the rate of 40 to 50 pounds per acre. DDT in oil should not be used as the oil may cause burning of the foliage. Sulfur used in dusting mixtures may also cause burning of the foliage and should be avoided.

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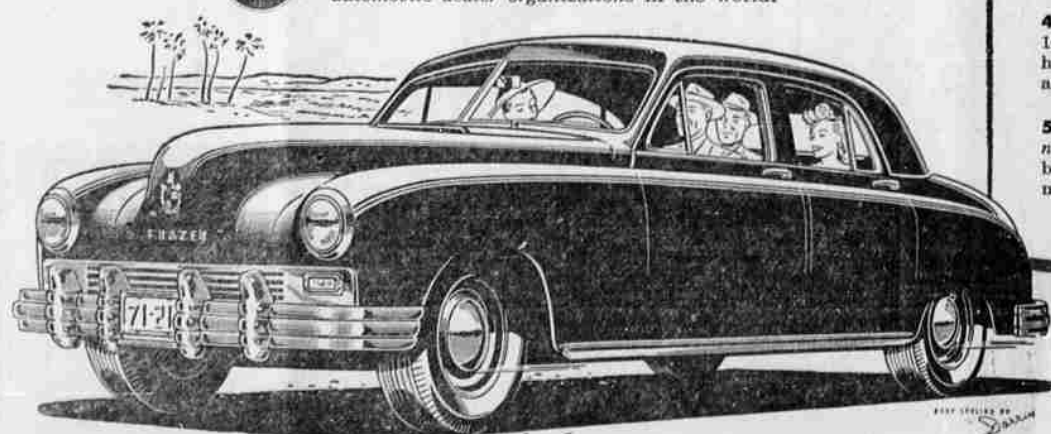
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
