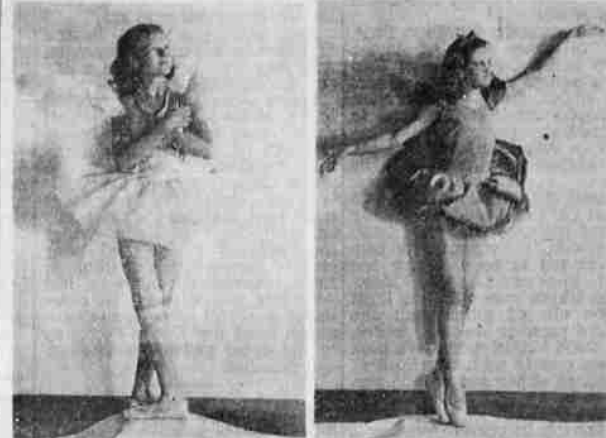
Los Angeles Boxer Dies Of Injuries in Bout

Opposing Health Bills Headed for Political Battle

NEA Washington Correspondent. WASHINGTON, D. C.—A Senate subcommittee on health under Sen. H. Alexander Smith of New Jersey is now taking a second look at a couple of bills intended to give the United States better medical care.

One of the bills is the work of Senators Taft, Smith, Ball and Donnell, all Republicans. The other is the work of Senators Murray, Wagner, Chavez, Taylor and McGrath, all Democrats. The two bills are about as different as Republicans and Democrats. But since the Republicans are running things, their bill has the edge.

Nothing is going to be done about either bill this year. The current excitement is merely a warmup for 1948, when the glorious spectacle of playing politics with public health will be unveiled before the voters.

The Democratic bill is a revise of the Murray-Wagner-Dingell national compulsory health insurance bill which has been passed around for the last four years. It would provide for payroll deductions up to 4 per cent on the first \$3600 of income—or up to \$144 a year—to give every one complete medical care by doctors of the patients' own choosing. This has been damned by the doctors as "socialized medicine."

Charity at issue. The Taft-Smith-Ball-Donnell bill on the other hand was conceived to meet American Medical Association objections to the Murray-Wagner-Dingell bill. For people who now can afford to and to pay their own doctor bills the Republican health bill would make no change. For people who can't, it would provide charity for doctors and hospitals.

Senator Taft estimates this might be only 20 per cent of the American people in the lowest income groups. The Democrats say that if this inability-to-pay principle were applied to every family with less than \$3600 annual income, about 60 per cent of the people would have to be taken care of as charity patients. They're both impossible estimates because the standards would be left to the states.

The Republican bill would set up a new National Health Agency headed by an outstanding physician.

Pedestrians Have Right of Way At Intersections

New strengthening amendments to Oregon's law requiring drivers to give pedestrians the right of way at intersection crosswalks went into effect July 5th and are now being enforced. Secretary of State Farrell reminds. Passed at the last session of the Oregon legislature, the law now requires drivers to stop for pedestrians occupying an intersection crosswalk in the driver's half of the roadway or who are approaching "so closely as to be in danger." Pedestrians who "leave a curb or other place of safety suddenly and move into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield" also violate the law under the new provisions.

Designed expressly for greater walking safety, the new statute underscores the principle that pedestrians must obey traffic signals and are subject to regulation as a part of the overall traffic picture. Cars still have right of way over pedestrians where no marked or unmarked crosswalks exist between intersections. City authorities are empowered to prohibit mid-block or diagonal crossing and other "jaywalking" practices. Subject to arrest are drivers who attempt to pass another vehicle that has stopped to allow pedestrians to proceed in accordance with the new law. In no case are pedestrians and motorists relieved from the duty of exercising "due care."

Jurisdictional Strikes Outlawed in California

SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 14.—(AP)—A bill declaring jurisdictional strikes to be unlawful and against the public policy of California was signed Saturday by Governor Warren.

The measure provides for damages to any person "injured or threatened with injury" by a work stoppage between rival unions.
