Rapid growth in the Umpqua Valley is keeping our various municipalities constantly involved with problems. Public services must be expanded, schools enlarged, recreational facilities established, and many other changes made to cope with demands of expanding populations.

The City of Myrtle Creek is casting off one source of constant headache. The municipality has operated its own power distribution system, buying energy from The California Oregon Power Company. Rapid growth, however, necessitates complete reconstruction of the transmission system and wholesale additions. The city has no money with which to do the job.

The City of Drain promises to be the first Umpqua Valley municipality with a swimming pool. Pouring of concrete is scheduled to start in the near future. The pool will be the most important feature of the North Douglas Living War Memorial, a project linking various recreational facilities into a unit honoring the men and women who saw service in the late war.

Yoncalla, neighbor to Drain, recently held its first Fourth of July celebration in recent years, the event being sponsored by the Yoncalla Saddle Club, a livestock riding group which promises to be of extreme importance as a civic organization.

Reedsport, bulging at the seams with new growth, is flirting with the idea of installing parking meters. Merchants are reported to have favored meters by a two-to-one vote at an informal poll.

It has been interesting to observe the progress of parking meters. In nearly every city they have met opposition from merchants, who felt the devices would chase business away.

Sutherland promises in the near future to be the only spot in the Umpqua Valley with railroad transportation other than that furnished by the "Friendly" Southern Pacific. The Weyerhaeuser Timber Company has been granted permission to construct a railroad from its holdings in the Calapooia to the Southern Pacific tracks in Sutherland.

We only hope that new railroad construction in the Umpqua Valley won't stop at Sutherland, but will be an omen of days to come when, we hope, the "Friendly" Southern Pacific will have a little competition in this area.

Zale Favored to Defeat Graziano in Tonight's Bout

CHICAGO, July 16.—(AP)—Tony Zale, world's middleweight champion, and challenger Rocky Graziano, two of the greatest offensive fighters in the past 10 years, battle tonight before upwards of 20,000 spectators who will contribute to a record all-time indoor gate of around \$450,000.

Orval Overall, Former Baseball Great, Dies

FRESNO, Calif., July 16.—(AP)—Orval Overall, 66, one of the great Major League pitchers for the Chicago Cubs from 1906 to 1910 under the management of Frank Chance, died here Monday of a heart attack.
