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Noted Colored Singers Dated at Baptist Church

Prof. and Mrs. Elbert Tindley, nationally known colored singers, will return to Roseburg for morning and evening services Sunday, July 20, at the First Baptist Church. The Tindleys were here recently and were so much in demand, that they were requested to return.

Prof. Tindley is thought by many to be the greatest living Gospel singer. He is the son of the famous Chas. A. Tindley, who during his lifetime was pastor of the largest Methodist Church in the world.

Mr. Tindley, Sr., wrote more than 300 songs, many of them still being old favorites among church people. Elbert sings many of his father's hymns.

Dr. Willard A. Pope of Portland travels with the Tindleys. He will speak briefly at the 11 o'clock service after several numbers by the Tindleys. A full program of music will be given by Mr. Tindley at the church at 8 o'clock Sunday evening.

Federal Aid to School Systems Disfavored

SALT LAKE CITY, July 16.—(AP)—Sharp opposition to federal aid in the field of education and fears that such help would lead

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to federal control were voiced today by a large majority of the governors who engaged in a round table discussion of education.

Speakers also emphasized that American history and democracy needed greater attention in school systems. Gov. Kim Sigler of Michigan, one of the 13 discussion leaders, assailed any un-American theories in teaching and declared the schools should stress the inculcation of law and order.

Among those who declared themselves opposed to federal assistance was Gov. Mon C. Wallgren of Washington.

Wallgren demanded that shifting of financial responsibilities from school districts to the state be stopped.

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
