Great Parade to Climax Annual Elks' Convention

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17. — (AP)—Installation of officers and a 100-unit parade were the wind-up features today for the 83rd national convention of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

By late afternoon the convention visitors—a total revised up to 40,000 by the registration office—will be starting home after the five-day meeting. Elaborate floats, depicting everything from a mammoth salmon to bees hovering about a hive, began assembling early in the day for the 2 P.M. start of the parade, expected to take upward of four hours to pass the reviewing stand at Pioneer postoffice on S.W. Sixth Avenue.

In yesterday's competitive events, the Los Angeles band captured first place in the A group with Seattle second and Santa Monica third. In competition for smaller bands, Alpena, Mich., was first, Anaheim, Calif., second, and Bremerton third. Los Angeles also won first in the glue club contest with Boise second and Terre Haute, Ind., third.

Vigilance in the defense of democracy was stressed by two speakers yesterday. Gen. Mark Clark said this country's best hope of peace is to remain strong—foreign countries "respect only the strong and despise weakness"—and Attorney General Tom C. Clark declared that "freedom once won is not won forever. . . . It must be earned by each succeeding generation."

More Boys, Girls Needed by Oregon Green Association

Chas. E. Ogle, executive secretary of the Oregon Green Association, was in Roseburg Wednesday making plans with Forrest Losee, chairman of the Douglas County KQG Association; and V. V. Harpham and Kenneth Minnick, committee members for the summer forest fire prevention program.

Ogle is visiting all counties in Oregon and meeting with committees to outline the program for each group. At a luncheon meeting at the Umpqua Hotel, Mr. Ogle stressed the need for a larger enrollment in the Oregon Green Guard, which is made up of boys and girls throughout the state.

Enrollment blanks for boys and girls interested in belonging can be obtained from Losee's Gift Shop or from Kenneth Minnick, county 4-H club agent.

Stressed at the meeting was the fact that fires prevented are more worthy of credit than those that must be controlled after discovery. As a means of fire prevention, Oregon Green Guards can put up window posters and other types of warnings, that will make campers and other individuals mindful of forest fire prevention.

Western Douglas County Elk Herd Said Increased

REEDSPORT — Sgt. H. M. Miles of the state police, accompanied by Officer Charles C. Johnson, motored recently into the Dean Mountain district of Douglas County, near the Coos County line, and report that more elk are ranging the district than in a great many years.

They report viewing a cow elk weighing more than a ton, with large calves, which is unusual among elk.

Quite recently, a complaint was filed with the State Game Commission by farmers of the Loon Lake and Ash Valley districts, that the elk are becoming a menace to crops.

The commission sent a biologist into the district, who, after an investigation, killed two large bull elk that were leading the herds into the fields and gardens.

Hunters and residents in the elk breeding areas of Douglas

County were rather startled by the decision of the State Game Commission to open the elk season in Coos County, but allow it to remain closed in Douglas County.

It would appear here that the Southwestern Oregon Sportsmen's Association, composed mostly of Coos County members, want the elk to breed in Douglas County, but want hunters to kill them only in Coos County to gain publicity for their elk hunting area.
