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CARR E. PAYNE

Carr E. Payne, 60, literally has carved his way around the world with a penknife on three different occasions. The fancy handicraftsman may be seen at work on gunstocks the remainder of this week in front of the J. V. Sporting Goods store on Cass street.

Using an ordinary pocket knife, and a sharp nail for some of the finer work, Payne turns out elaborately fancy canes, walking sticks and swagger sticks from broom handles, mop handles and other wood material.

He was busy this morning turning out a beautiful job on a

.410 shot-gun stock for a local resident. Payne, an easy-going fellow, but continually whittling on wood, which is evidenced in his strong arms and wrists, has been around the world three times in the last 43 years, and has carved fancy designs on the stocks of an estimated 11,000 rifles.

He takes an average of two days to complete a "real good and complete" rifle stock job and has several exhibits which have rated him as unsurpassed by many well-known sportsmen. The charge may run anywhere from \$10 to \$400, depending on the extent and delicacy of the carving. The average gun job will cost about \$25.

Carr E. Payne, D. R. Payne once carved a cane which he sent to the late President Roosevelt. Later, while passing through Washington, Payne dropped in at the White House. He said he talked to Roosevelt for about 15 minutes about canes and mining. Roosevelt's cane was made from yew wood, a variety excellent for the purpose because of its twisted shape.

Payne was born in Danville, Ill. During World War I, he served 23 months overseas. Wandering around the globe he ended up mining on the Klamath river in Siskiyou county, of California for five years, but is now earning his livelihood carving.

SEATTLE, July 16. — (AP) — Three men were held for questioning in the city jail today in connection with the fatal stabbing of George Rice, 21, during an argument which began at last night's boxing match at the arena.

Police said one of the men held—Robert George Johnson, 31—told them the fight started when Rice took offense at their rooting for one of the boxers. Another of the held men—Kenneth Ralph Bonthius, 21,—said it started when Rice objected to the use of profanity by one of the men.

The third man jailed—Homer

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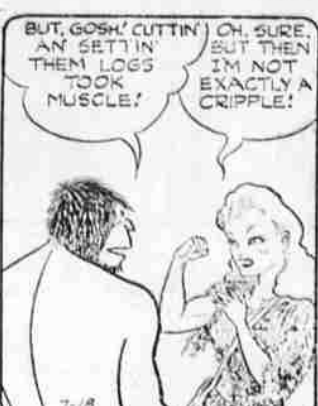
