LEARN TO SWIM

The Douglas County Chapter of the American Red Cross has announced its annual Swim School, starting July 29. It is to be hoped the school will have a large attendance, for this activity is of utmost importance from a protection standpoint.

Water plays a great part in recreational habits of our population. Our close proximity to lakes, rivers, ocean beaches, etc., leads us to select recreational spots close to bodies of water. Water offers the most pleasant entertainment in many forms—fishing, bathing, boating, etc. But each needs life insurance in the form of swimming ability.

Several of our fishermen friends confess they cannot swim. They run extreme risk each time they wade in the swift waters of the Umpqua or its tributaries, for these are treacherous streams, full of slippery boulders, deep pockets, sheer rock ledges, etc., where a misstep may easily prove fatal. If we are to play around in and upon water we should protect ourselves by at least rudimentary swimming ability.

The best time to learn is during childhood, before we have had time to form fears and prejudices and when we respond more readily to instruction. The annual Red Cross school offers opportunity for every youngster to perfect his swimming technique and, as he becomes older, to learn correct methods of lifesaving.

Those of us "born thirty years too soon" who learned to swim the hard way, usually by being shoved off a dock where we must paddle, or else, could not, at similar age, begin to compete with the modern youngster who receives expert instruction from the start. While we learned to swim, after a fashion, and while some, with natural instinct for the water, became proficient, today's youngster has far better opportunity.

The great regret is the lack of facilities. The condition of water in the South Umpqua River necessitates immunization of all students against typhoid. But we must continue to use the river for our Swim School, as well as for recreation, until the time comes—soon, we hope—when it will be possible to furnish a suitable municipal swimming pool.

We believe it would be possible to improve recreational qualities of the South Umpqua River, and we plan to suggest a program in that direction in the near future. Improvement will require several years, and at best would not eliminate need for a swimming pool.

But despite its obvious handicaps, the Red Cross Swim School is able to teach swimming to all who desire to learn, and improve ability of those who are in the beginner stage.

Last weekend three persons were drowned in Oregon while 12 Portland residents were rescued by beach life-guards. Seldom a day goes by during the vacation season that we do not read of deaths from drowning. Some of these deaths possibly could not be prevented, but, for the most part, they are totally unnecessary. Victims either were unable to handle themselves capably in water, or ignored well-established rules for water safety. Swim Schools not only teach swimming but provide instruction as well in safety.

We would urge adults as well as children to take advantage of the forthcoming opportunity. We realize it is somewhat embarrassing to adults to enter a school primarily set up for children. But arrangements have been made for evening classes for adults. Any feeling of embarrassment will quickly disappear once a person has started the course of instruction. But most important is the enrollment of children. Parents of non-swimming children should not neglect this opportunity for free instruction.

Notice of the school dates is given early to permit all interested persons to obtain their necessary typhoid immunization in ample time.

Committee Named On Streamlining Federal Agencies

WASHINGTON, July 18. — (AP) A special 12-member commission to study and make recommendations for streamlining the executive branch of the government was completed yesterday with the appointment by President Truman of four representatives.

Mr. Truman told his news conference that his representatives on the commission, scheduled to be headed by former President Herbert Hoover, will be: James Forrestal, secretary of the navy; Arthur S. Fleming, civil service commissioner; Dean Acheson, former undersecretary of state; and George H. Mead of Dayton, Ohio, industrial executive.

Hoover was appointed by Speaker Martin (R-Mass.) yesterday, along with James Rowe of Montana, formerly an assistant to the late President Roosevelt; Rep. Clarence Brown (R-Ohio) and Rep. Carter Manasco (D-Ala.).

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), president of the Senate, has named Joseph P. Kennedy, former ambassador to Great Britain; Dr. James K. Pollock of the University of Michigan political science faculty; and Senators Aiken (R-Vt.) and McClellan (D-Ark.).

The commission will study the executive branch and report to congress next year with recommendations for changes in the interest of efficiency and elimination of overlapping functions.

The congressional act setting up the group called for four appointees each by the President, Speaker of the House and acting President of the Senate.

Successor to Convicted Commissioner Named

SEATTLE, July 18. — (AP) Don C. McLean, 66, Seattle businessman and former Pierce County legislator, was appointed Kigg County commissioner yesterday, succeeding Joseph A.

Whetstone, recently sentenced to the state penitentiary after he was convicted of bribery. McLean, who moved here from Tacoma in 1929, built up a large van and storage company which he sold two years ago.

Truman Will Get Demo Nod—Farley

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 18. — (AP) James A. Farley, former chairman of the Democratic National Committee, said yesterday he would be "delighted" to support the Democratic ticket in 1948.

He said President Truman will be a "cinch" to receive the party's presidential nomination but "I haven't the slightest idea" as to who will be the vice-presidential candidate.

He declined comment on the possibility of Washington's Governor Wallgren as a vice-presidential candidate.

He said the vice-presidential nomination "is up to the president. The president always makes the nomination and everybody will go along."

Farley, who broke with the late President Roosevelt, said "I didn't believe in a third term and I didn't believe in a fourth term but I would be delighted to work for President Truman and his running mate."

Asked about the Democrats' prospects in 1948, he said "Democracy" prospects always "look good" but they will depend on the economic and foreign situation in the summer and fall of 1948.

Methodist Bishop McConnell Given Northwest Post

DES MOINES, July 17. — (AP) Methodist Bishop Francis J. McConnell will assume administration of the 570 churches of the Northwest, Ore. area, Bishop Wilbur E. Hammaker, Denver, president of the College of Bishops of the western jurisdiction, announced today.

Bishop McConnell, who prior to his retirement in 1944 was for 16 years resident bishop of the New York area, succeeds the late Bishop Bruce R. Baxter.

The territory which Bishop McConnell will supervise includes Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Alaska.

Bishop Hammaker here for the national meeting of the board of lay activities, said the appointment was effective immediately. Bishop McConnell will retain office until July, 1948, when the western jurisdictional conference will elect bishops and assign a successor.

During the time Bishop McConnell was resident bishop of the New York area, he served four years as president of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.

Prior to his service in the New York area, McConnell supervised the Pittsburg and Denver areas of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. He was elected bishop in 1912 while president of the De Paul University.

OLYMPIA, July 18. — (AP) A petition for recall of U. S. Senator Harry P. Cain (R-Wash.) was filed with Secretary of State Belle Reeves yesterday by William H. Hines, Oregon state representative from Clark county.

It was signed by 251 persons, most of them of Clark county. Mrs. Reeves said she "doubted" the legality of a recall of a federal officer but will ask Atty. Gen. Smith, Troy for a written opinion before taking action on the petition.

The recall petition charged Cain with "malfeasance or misfeasance" in office because he voted for the Taft-Hartley bill and co-sponsored the Cain-Russell housing disposal bill.

The petition described the latter measure as "injurious to the best interests of the people, being beneficial only to a small special interest group, which constitutes class legislation."

Majority of Displaced Persons Are Catholics SEATTLE, July 18. — (AP) Despite a feeling in the United States that the majority of displaced persons in Europe are Jewish, the opposite is true, George Rundquist, associate secretary of the National Citizens Committee on displaced persons, said here yesterday.

"Actually," Rundquist said, "about 65 per cent of the displaced persons are Catholic, 15 per cent are Jewish and the rest are Protestant."

Rundquist visited church, labor and veterans' organizations to gain support for the Stratton bill which would admit 400,000 refugees, at present in Europe, to the United States at the rate of 100,000 a year.
