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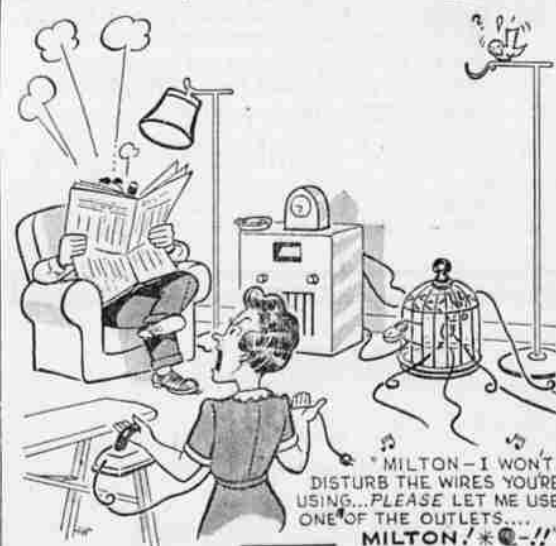

Dutch Troops Pinching Off Indonesia Units

The Dutch "local police action." Dutch troops, mainly United States-trained marines, were said to have captured four East-Java coastal points after going ashore from naval vessels in a large-scale operation yesterday. They were reported to have established bridgeheads along a 35-mile coast, at road between two of those points—Probolinggo and Sitohondo.

First reports from Sumatra said Dutch troops "ramped off" in local actions yesterday at three towns on that big island north-west of Java and had completed the pending operation without casualties.

On Java itself, most populous island of the East Indies, news bulletins and communiques from both sides indicated that at least seven Dutch operations were under way in what observers interpreted as an attempt to pinch off the Republic into isolated segments for a final cleanup.

to resume generally normal handling of all traffic.

All-Out Strike

Some 3,500 engineers were affected by the strike. Trains en route when the strike began continued to division points, where engineers left them. Points at which the engineers walked off included Oakland, Bakersfield, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Sacramento and Roseville, Calif., Reno and Sparks, Nev., Eugene, Ore., El Paso, Texas, Ogden, Utah, and Yuma and Tucson, Ariz.

Some passengers slept aboard halted trains, others wandered about stations awaiting word from the negotiations in San Francisco. Before the strike ended, the company had begun arrangements for transporting passengers by buses.

Bonneville Transmission Lines Fund Cut Protested

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(AP)—Quick Senate approval of a compromise Interior Department appropriations bill allowing \$89,528,038 of new funds for Western reclamation projects is expected. The House accepted the conference report yesterday with only a few voices raised in dissent.

Reps. Ellsworth and Angell, Oregon Republicans, protested to the House that the Senate-House

conference struck out all except \$28,000 of a \$1,021,000 item for extending Bonneville transmission lines into Oregon.

The bill contains a provision prohibiting the use of construction money by the Bonneville Power Administration for construction work by "force account" except for "management and operation, maintenance and repairs, engineering and supervision, routine construction work, or in case of emergencies."

Lay Hearing on Stolen Property Charge Set

Preliminary hearing for Glenn Oscar Lay, who was arrested at Steamboat Springs, Colo., as a suspect in the Carstens Furniture Store robbery with two companions, is scheduled at 10 A. M. Wednesday before Justice of the Peace Thomas C. Hartfield. Lay is charged with possession of stolen property. He is allegedly implicated in the Carstens case by reason of a bank check, taken from the Carstens safe and bearing his alleged endorsement, being cashed in a local tavern.

Gasoline Fire Kills Four Persons, Sweeps 4 Blocks

MINOT, N. D., July 22.—(AP)—A fourth man died today of burns suffered in a series of gasoline explosions which caused fires that ravaged nine business establishments in a four-block area of downtown Minot.

The fourth victim, Orton Nelson, a fireman, was burned while fighting the flames.

The others were Chester Westom, 32, William Foster, 43, and Adam Runyan, 45.

Three persons were injured but were reported in good condition today.

CHICK OUTPUT UPPED

PORTLAND, July 22.—(AP)—Oregon commercial hatcheries have turned out 6,338,000 chicks during the first half of 1947, well above the 5,054,000 hatched during the first half of last year.

This report came from the U. S. Department of Agriculture crop reporting service. June hatchings were below average, with 450,000 chicks.

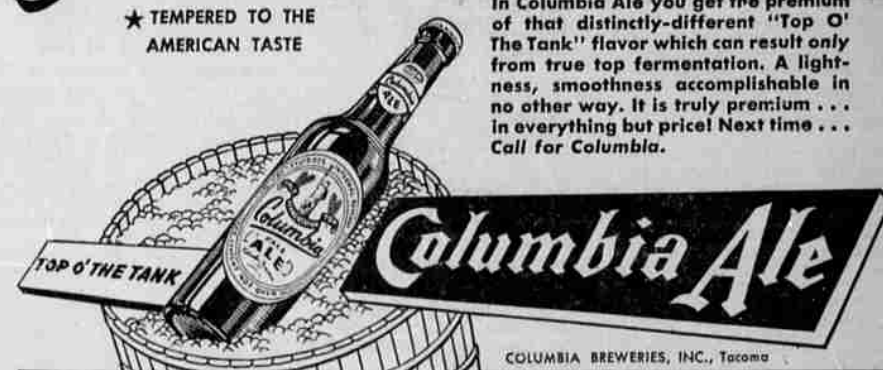
