Final U. S.-Soviet Split Threatened Over Japan

er this could be done legally. While an interpretation remains to be worked out, some authorities recalled that as early as the United Nations declaration of January, 1942, the United States, Britain, Russia and other major nations at war with the axis pledged themselves "not to make a separate armistice or peace with the enemies."

Russia was not then at war with Japan, so it is a question whether the pledge would be considered legally binding in the present situation.

The Soviet reaction to American proposals for beginning work on a Japanese treaty August 19 was announced yesterday by the Moscow radio.

The United States had proposed July 11 that 11 nations, including the great powers, should meet at Washington or San Francisco to organize the treaty drafting. A major point of the proposal was that the nations work under a system of decisions by two-thirds vote—a procedure which would deny any one nation the right of veto.

This marked a radical depart-

ure from the German and other European treaty making procedures in two respects. It included nations other than the great powers and it denied the veto privilege.

In rejecting the proposal, the Soviets did not comment specifically on these two points.

LAKE SUCCESS, July 24.—(AP)—Certain United Nations delegates expressed belief today that the future of the world organization might hinge on the outcome of the showdown fight between the United States and Russia over the Balkans.

Authoritative sources said that if Russia vetoes a U. S. proposal to set up an international watch over the Balkan borders Britain, the United States and other countries might feel forced to take action outside the United Nations.

Although British and American officials here were reluctant to discuss such drastic action, it was learned that the idea of establishing a border watch commission outside the United Nations was being considered as a last resort should Russia balk security council action on the Balkans.

Heavy Fire at Del Deals
Estimated \$100,000 Loss

HOOD RIVER, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—A fire of undetermined origin swept through the Oregon Lumber Company's drying platform north of the company mill at Dee today, causing damage which may reach \$100,000.

The fire broke out early this morning in the Apple Growers Association packing warehouse, and spread to the lumber piles and stacks of flooring lumber. The apple warehouse was an old frame structure used for storage. Heat of the blaze warped the Mount Hood railroad tracks. About 75 firefighters controlled the flames before they spread to the lumber mill itself.

Odd Instruments Used in Concert At Baptist Church

The world's most mysterious instrument, the "Victor Theremin," will be featured in the second concert to be given here by the nationally known Mason Swiss Bell Ringers at the First Baptist Church, Lane and Rose Sts., tonight at 8 o'clock.

This mysterious instrument has no keyboard, strings, reeds or pipes and responds to the motion of the performer's hands waving over it in space without being touched. It is an electronic instrument invented by a young Russian scientist by the name of Leon Theremin.

The program will also consist of Gospel songs and sacred hymns played on the Swiss hand bells, musical glasses, singing saw, golden vibratop, solovox and the world's largest set of triple octave chimes.

The Mason Swiss Bell Ringers, consisting of the Rev. and Mrs. Benard Mason, are known in every state in the Union having made seven trans-continental concert tours and played in thousands of schools, clubs and churches during the last 15 years.

There will be no admission charge but a free-will offering will be received.

A special feature in tonight's program will be the playing of music with a photo-cell, two flash lights and a whirling disc, described as a "very marvelous scientific musical demonstration."

The church auditorium was packed last night for the first concert by the artists.
