REEDSPORT, July 24.—Floyd

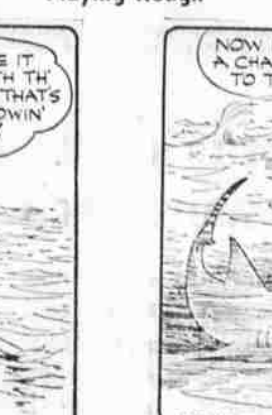

Fugitive Ax-Slayer of 2 Men Sought in Alaska

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, July 24.—(AP)—U. S. Marshal Stanley J. Nichols, heading what is described as the largest manhunt in Alaska's modern history, expressed doubt today that the fugitive double ax-slayer will be taken alive.

Nichols said escape from the rough terrain of the mosquito-plagued region is virtually impossible and expressed belief the hunted man, Leon Jones, 43-year-old carpenter at the Big Delta military project, might take his own life before being taken.

Jones is sought on warrants charging him with the slaying of two men following a heavy drinking party at an Indian encampment some 150 miles southeast of Fairbanks. The slain men were Donald R. Harris, 33, also a Big Delta construction worker, and Carl Ahnstrom, 68, longtime Alaska trapper and prospector.

PENSION PLAN K.O'd

LONDON, July 24.—(AP)—The judicial committee of the Privy Council today ruled invalid the Alberta legislature's social credit plan, which would have provided a \$500 annual pension to unemployed Albertans.

The Privy Council's Judicial Committee is the final court of appeal for cases from Canada.

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Tortuous Climb Faced to Reach Plane Wreckage

LONGMIRE, Mount Rainier National Park, July 24.—(AP)—From a 5,800-foot high base camp, a party of five experienced mountaineers faced a tortuous climb today to Mt. Rainier's formidable South Tahoma glacier in quest of the wreckage of the Marine transport plane which disappeared last December 10 with 32 men aboard.

The trek over treacherous icy and rocky terrain is expected to require at least four or five hours, depending on conditions close to the 10,000-foot level where Assistant Ranger Bill Butler saw through field glasses Monday what he believes to be scattered pieces of the missing plane.

Forest rangers reported the face of the glacier crossed with "terrible crevasses, some so deep a whole plane could drop into them."

Butler reported the glacier was covered with several feet of packed snow and "it seems extremely doubtful that bodies will be found." If members of the party find the plane wreckage, they expect to cut identifying parts from the ice with hacksaws.

Parents of two Washington State Marines who were aboard the plane on the ill-fated San Diego-Seattle flight came to the mountain yesterday to watch the search preparations. They were

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Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Walker of Hoquiam and Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Simmons of Kalama. Their sons were Pvt. Donald J. Walker and Pvt. Leslie R. Simmons Jr. The two families were active in promoting the \$5,000 reward for discovery of the missing transport.

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
