

Disabled Trained For Work to Help Selves and Nation

WASHINGTON — There are about 230,000 blind persons in the United States now, and an estimated 25 per cent of them could be rehabilitated into employment.

These blind are a part of the army of more than 1,500,000 disabled men and women civilians of working age who are eligible for aid under the Federal Security Agency's vocational rehabilitation program. Michael J. Shortley, director of the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, estimates that the national wealth could be increased by \$2,000,000 if all of these handicapped people could be made fit for job-holding.

The program operates in the various states, with 75 per cent of the overall operating expenses carried by the federal government. Shortley says an average of 40,000 disabled civilians a year has been placed in jobs since 1943. Seventy-five per cent of those rehabilitated last year were unemployed, and 16 per cent of them had never worked before.

Yearly Rate High
Shortley figures that about 250,000 persons become disabled each year, about 30,000 of whom are blind. Right now about 170,000 disabled are in the process of rehabilitation.

Currently, Shortley's office is conducting a training institute in Washington—the first of its kind—to stimulate commercial placement of blind civilians for employment specialists from 18 state vocational rehabilitation agencies.

"This is a practical course featuring subjects which a blind person must master in order to engage successfully in a small business enterprise," says Shortley. "On completion of the course, state representatives will return to their home offices equipped with another worthwhile tool for use in preparing eligible blind men and women for employment and placing them in suitable jobs."

A lot of disabled persons don't know of this program, says Shortley. Persons of working force age, say from 16 to 65, can apply to their state offices for aid. After making application they are given a free medical examination, counsel and guidance in arriving at a suitable job future with the individual's own hopes and desires always taken into consideration.

Then, if necessary—and this has been found true in only about 20 per cent of the cases—the physical restoration program begins. This includes surgery to remove or reduce any disability. In many instances, artificial devices are provided, such as limbs, trusses, hearings aids, glass eyes and so on.

Psychological and aptitude tests are given, and the applicant is placed on the right job. A post-placement follow-up is made in every instance to determine whether the individual is making the proper adjustment and so on. Before an applicant is ready to take on a job he has to demonstrate he can manage one to five jobs in 20 different industries.

City Manager Chosen For Cottage Grove

COTTAGE GROVE, July 24. — Benjamin F. Heinz, last year's president of the Portland Junior Chamber of Commerce, was elected city manager of Cottage Grove at a special meeting of the council Monday. Heinz, 38, one of more than 20 applicants for the position since voters approved the manager plan last winter, was selected because of his work in Portland where he was with the city administration for nearly four years.

During the war Heinz worked for the Portland city schools in war production training. He is author of a book, "Worker's Safety Guide," as well as numerous magazine articles on safety.

Congress Votes Hotel Purchase For Naval School

WASHINGTON, July 24.—(AP)—Congressional action was virtually completed yesterday on a bill to authorize purchase of the Del Monte Hotel in Monterey, Calif., for a naval post-graduate school.

Both the House and Senate passed identical measures authorizing a \$2,500,000 appropriation to acquire the hotel and equip it to accommodate 500 to 600 Navy line officers.

The bill probably will be sent to the White House tomorrow after completion of parliamentary procedures necessitated because the House and Senate each passed separate bills.

The House Veterans Committee approved a new bill to boost government financial help to student veterans—minus a ban on such assistance to Communists.

The bill would grant a student veteran without dependents \$75 a month instead of the present \$65. Instead of the present \$90, a veteran with one dependent would get \$105 and one with more than one dependent would draw \$120.

Canned Fruits Omitted
The Senate Agriculture Committee yesterday approved a House bill to eliminate canned fruits from marketing agreements authorized by the Agricultural Adjustment Act.

The committee also sent to the Senate floor two other House bills:

1. To make it a petty offense to go into national forests which the secretary of agriculture has closed to the public. A maximum fine of \$500 or a six-month jail sentence is possible under the bill. It would not change the more severe penalties for such acts as cutting trees or starting fires.

2. To provide that state agricultural experiment stations can spend 20 per cent of appropriations for marketing research purposes.

A House Labor Subcommittee put aside until fall a bill to boost the national minimum wage 50 per cent.

Chairman McConnell told news-men the subcommittee agreed there would be no more meetings at this session of Congress. In the fall, he said, the group plans hearings to cover not only the minimum wage but other parts of the wage-hour program.

Russia, U. S. Face New Showdown on Jap Peace Treaty

Another critical showdown between Russia and the western allies is pressed by Moscow's refusal of the American invitation to join an 11-nation conference on August 19 to discuss a Japanese peace treaty.

Russia charges that the United States acted in a unilateral manner, and says that preliminary work on the Japanese treaty should be done by the council of foreign ministers. That is to say,

the Soviet Union wants to follow the same procedure as that which resulted in the disastrous failure of the Big Four to frame a German treaty because of disagreements between Russia on the one side and America, Britain and France on the other.

What Washington proposed regarding the Japanese treaty was that the work be done by a veto-free parley of eleven interested nations, to be held in Washington or San Francisco. Decisions would be made by a two-thirds vote, with or without agreement by the great powers—a procedure which would be a far-reach from the European Big Four meetings where a veto by one power scuttled the ship. Finally there would be a general peace conference of all forty-eight nations which were at war with Japan.

The eleven nations which America proposed should draft the treaty all have a special interest in it. They are the United States, Britain, China, Russia, France, Canada, The Netherlands, India, Australia, New Zealand and the Philippines.

Hard Decision For U. S.
Moscow's rejection of this proposal puts Washington in position of having to decide whether to try to go ahead with a 10-nation conference which would frame a treaty without participation of one of the countries chiefly interested—Soviet Russia. We must assume that this contingency was foreseen, but it nevertheless creates a serious situation.

Should it be decided to go ahead without the Muscovites, there will be another complication to iron out—not a serious difficulty but one which has been causing some heart-burning. A British Common-

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wealth meeting had been fixed for August 26 in Canberra, Australia, to consider the Commonwealth position regarding a Japanese treaty. The British have asked that the suggested peace conference be postponed.

When the American proposal was announced, General Douglas MacArthur was described as highly pleased, and Japan generally was jubilant. As far back as March, MacArthur called for an early treaty with Japan and he has said that it should set the pattern for future peace throughout the world.
