The Pacific Coast League's hottest team at the moment, Seattle's Rainiers, get a whack at the leading Los Angeles Angels in a four-game series starting tonight. The Rainiers and Angels made it two-out-of-three in short series by winning last night from San Francisco and Portland, respectively, and will tee off on each other at Seattle for the rest of the week. The Rainiers are 10 games behind in fourth place. This is their best chance to date to get closer.

Seattle pounded three Seal pitchers for 17 hits in slugging out a 10-inning, 9-8 decision. White started the scoring with a homer for the Seals, but the Rainiers came back with circuit smashes by Hemsley, Novikoff and Rocco. Hemsley's double and Novikoff's single accounted for the winning run.

The Angels breezed to a 6-2 win over the Beavers on Lynn's five-hit job. The league leaders touched Heiser for 12 blows, including Malone's homer. Heiser drove one over the fence, too. Los Angeles' lead stretched to five games as the second-place Oakland A's fell, 7-3, before Sacramento. Holcomb let the Oaks down with six hits. Marty's two-run home paced an 11-hit Sox attack on Soriano. The Soles nailed the series, two-one.

Musial's Batting Sparks Cardinals' Climb to 3rd Spot

Trace the rise in efficiency of Stan Musial with the stick and you'll find it parallels the rise of the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals from their cellar position of not so long ago to their present eminence in third place. The Cardinals' great first baseman, who ended the 1946 National League season with the most hits, the most doubles and triples as well as a top .365 batting average which helped him win the most valuable player award, got off to his worst start in all of his nine years in professional baseball.

Coincidental with Musial's failure to get many baseruns, the Cards also got off to their worst start in history. The darling of Donora, Pa., began his climb in June—and so did the Redbirds.

It was Musial's 10th inning single that drove in Schoendienst with the run yesterday that gave the Cards a 3-2 overtime victory over the Giants and sent them into third place, only one half length behind the second place Boston Braves.

Dodgers Extend Win Streak — The front running Brooklyn Dodgers zoomed to their sixth straight win by defeating the Reds in Cincinnati, 6-1. The victory enabled the Dodgers to increase their margin to six games over the Braves and retain their

six and a half game bulge over the Redbirds.

The Chicago Cubs hurdled the Reds into fifth place by defeating the Braves, 6-4. Rookie Outfielder Cliff Aberson provided the punch with two triples which drove in three runs and rookie right-hander Pitcher Doyle Lade spaced nine hits effectively for his eighth win.

Pittsburgh vacated the National League cellar and dumped the Phillies into that spot by sweeping both ends of a double header from Philadelphia 8-6 and 3-2.

Enjoying their best hitting day of the season, the American League's leading New York Yankees pounded three St. Louis hurlers for 20 hits to trounce the Browns 15-4. Lindell, Henrich and McQuinn hit home runs for the Yanks. Heath slammed homers number 18 and 19 for the Browns to tie Boston's Ted Williams for the league lead.

The Yanks' first place margin over runner-up Detroit rose to 11½ games when the Washington Senators, behind the four-hit pitching of Masterson, defeated Newhouse and the Tigers, 3-0, at the Capitol City.

Feller Wins No. 12 — Bobby Feller became the first American League pitcher to win 12 games when he hurled the Cleveland Indians to a 6-1 victory over the Athletics in Philadelphia. Feller fanned five walked two and allowed five hits. Joe Gordon rapped his 16th home run for the Indians.

With Williams smacking his 19th four-bagger and driving in two runs, and Galehouse, Brownie castoff, scattering 10 hits for his fifth win in a Red Sox uniform, Boston continued its home mastery over Chicago by trimming the White Sox 8-2. The Red Sox have yet to lose to the White Sox at Fenway Park this year.
