Japs to be Top Allies of U. S., Fr. Flanagan Says

SPOKANE, July 24.—(AP)—Father E. J. Flanagan, famous founder of Boys Town, said today in an interview that "the Japanese people are going to be our greatest allies."

Fresh from a three-month tour of Japan and Korea, Father Flanagan said the Japanese are a great people. They are not complaining. They are working hard. As a matter of fact we are their liberators from false leadership. Father Flanagan was invited to Japan and Korea by Gen. Douglas MacArthur as an advisor on child welfare. He said the Japanese, never having had the problem of homeless children before, didn't know how to tackle it. "But they are willing to do everything we tell them to do," he said. "They just don't know how."

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Dictatorship Seen In City Vigilance

SEATTLE, July 25.—(AP)—The Most Rev. Gerald Shaughnessy, Catholic bishop of the Diocese of Seattle, said Wednesday night that "dictatorship is prevalent in our cities, towns and states" and that "dictators, even in death, have won the victory."

He spoke at the Diamond Jubilee Pacific Coast convention of the Young Ladies' Institute, a Catholic Charities Organization.

Referring to a recent police drive here in which many people on the streets at night were stopped, Bishop Shaughnessy said an altar boy on his way to an early mass was among those questioned. Others, he said, included a policeman off duty and a former service man with school books under his arms.

Whimsically, he urged the banquet guests to go to their homes or hotels early to avoid any such incidents, and added:

"What is going to prevent them from stopping a priest out on a sick call?"

"We are losing freedom in typical cities throughout the country when they can stop you on the street merely when you are out late."

Police have been operating under a new city ordinance giving them wide powers to investigate "apparently suspicious" activities of persons out at night. In a test case, a Superior Court judge ruled the ordinance constitutional.

"I am surprised that Bishop Shaughnessy has not come to me about the matter," Police Chief George D. Eastman commented later.

Foreign Policy to be Top 1948 Issue, Cake Says

BAKER, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—The principal campaign issue in the 1948 race for president is likely to be America's foreign policy, in the opinion of Ralph H. Cake of Portland, National Republican Committeeman for Oregon, who addressed a meeting of Baker County Republicans here last night.

Optimistic over the prospects for Republican victory in the next presidential election, Cake

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did not attempt to predict the name of the nominee.

Concerning the conflicting views between Republican leaders, Cake said that is was a good omen. Divergence brings out the best ideas in the country. The conflicting views between congressman Stockman and Senator Cordon of Oregon are not serious, Cake believes. Each has expressed his honest opinions and this is a good sign. Both men have

Bass Yields Angler \$1,000 in Fish Derby

HOT SPRINGS, N. M., July 25.—(AP)—You've heard stories about those big fish that got away, so listen now to the tale of George Mackey.

He didn't get away—and just pulling it in netted him a cool \$1,000.

Mackey, an Albuquerque bakery employee, hooked the two-pound, five-ounce bass yesterday in Elephant Butte reservoir. It was just a nice catch until he found a tag attached.

That identified the bass as one of 20 worth \$1,000 and released in the Hot Springs Sporting club's \$55,000 fish derby. The other 19 are still in the lake.

W. C. Bristol, Ex-Federal Attorney of Oregon, Dies

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—(AP)—William Coleman Bristol, Portland attorney who served as U. S. district attorney for Oregon from 1905 to 1908, died yesterday at the age of 78.

Born in New York, he moved to Seattle in 1897, and two years later established practice in Portland. He was a founder of the Royal Rosarians here, grand master of the Oregon Masons in 1914, and former president of the Portland Gun club and Portland Golf club.

Surviving are widow, a son, and two daughters including Mrs. Donald Moore, Eugene.

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Rural Area Fire Protection Status Fully Explained

There has been an apparent misunderstanding among residents of Douglas County, particularly those of the Umpqua River Valley near the City of Roseburg, concerning the protection areas of the Douglas Forest Protective Association, Supervising Warden Fred M. Southwick said today.

The area extending approximately two miles outside of the City of Roseburg are within the boundary of the rural fire district, and the protection of this area is the responsibility of that district, Southwick said.

There exists between the boundaries of the Douglas Forest Protective Association and the rural fire district, an area approximately 18 miles long and 12 miles wide which is classified by law as a "non-patrol area." This area is primarily agricultural and as such is not required by law to pay a forest protection assessment.

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of the land owners themselves and although the protective association has taken action on fires in this area in the past, when time and men have been available, the organization is in no way obligated to fight fire in this area, Southwick declared.

In the future it will contribute its crews and equipment only when they can be spared from their normal duties of protecting and administering those lands within their own boundaries. "It might be pointed out, however, Southwick said, "that this non-patrol area can have adequate protection. The law provides that such areas can organize their own fire protection districts and

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thereby insure proper and full protection. For further information on the matter, inquiry should be made at the county courthouse." The association has available for inspection maps that clearly outline the various boundaries mentioned above.

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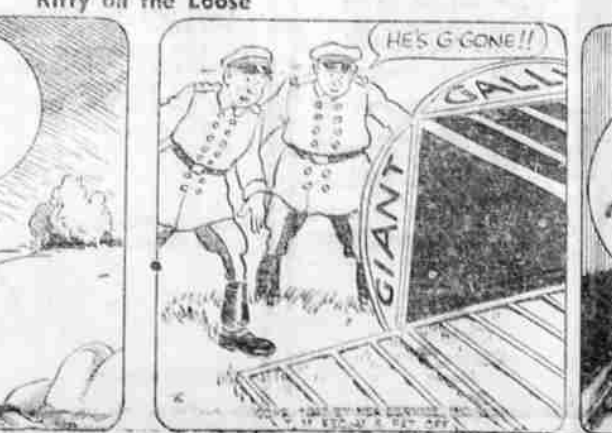
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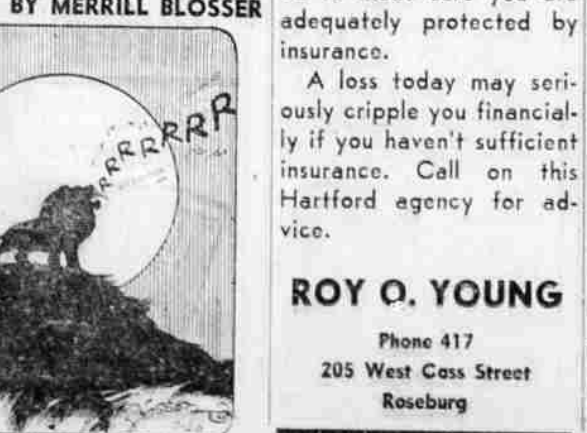
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
