British Nab More Jews for Transfer to Cyprus Island - HAIFA, July 28. - (AP) - British naval forces escorted into Haifa Harbor today two small wooden vessels jammed with approximately 1,100 uncertified Jewish immigrants.

Both refugee ships were sponsored by Haganah, Jewish underground organization, in a new campaign to smash the British blockade barring Jewish immigration to the Holy Land.

Their arrival followed by little more than a week the interception of the 7,000-ton steamer President Warfield, whose 4,500 Jewish passengers are now aboard three British ships en route back to their point of departure in Southern France.

The first ship to arrive today was the 300-ton motor-powered "Return to Zion" - originally named the Luciana - loaded with 396 immigrants whom a Jewish source said had come from a North African port.

Her passengers, who included 122 children and 71 women, were transferred quickly to British deportation ships, singing the Hebrew-national Jewish anthem as they walked the necessary 100 yards along a pier.

Four men and a woman, the first passengers to be removed, refused to board and were carried off by British troops. The remainder of the immigrants made the transfer from ship-to-ship without resistance.

Two ill men and five women were taken to a government hospital. Most of the passengers, said to be chiefly Oriental Jews, were young and most were in rags.

Two new school buses to serve Myrtle Creek - Two new Myrtle Creek School buses were delivered by Sig Pett of Roseburg last week.

One of the vehicles will take the South Myrtle Creek run and the other will be on the Missouri Bottom route at the opening of school.

Mother Truman Laid to Rest With Simple Ceremony

GRANDVIEW, Mo. July 28. - (AP) - Mrs. Martha Ellen Truman, daughter of a Missouri pioneer farmer and mother of the nation's president, will be buried this afternoon on a shaded knoll in Kansas—the town where she was born 94 years ago.

The ceremony will be simple and private, as the mother and her devoted son, Harry S. Truman, had previously agreed.

The funeral services in Mrs. Truman's plainly furnished living room were for the family alone.

Only three of four cars will follow Mrs. Truman's cortege on its 17-mile trip to Forest Hill cemetery from the little cottage on dusty, unpaved Feland Avenue in Grandview, near the Frisco Railroad tracks.

It was in Grandview the president spent his 12 days away from the world's highest office in May because his mother had a sinking spell; there he was bound Saturday when word of her heart's failure overtook him in the presidential plane.

Forest Hill cemetery made ready grave in a block where rests John Anderson Truman, the president's father. He was buried there November 4, 1914.

The Truman sorrow, though more than a family affair, was sheltered from the curious by secret service men, state and local police who blocked roads for two blocks around the frame house.

In the open casket, where close friends said their goodbyes yesterday, lay Martha Truman in her favorite blue dress—a dress she bought last February to wear on a visit to Harry in the White House.

Accident Bans Trip - That trip was never made, because of a fall on February 13 fractured her hip and led to the heart strain which brought about her death. On an earlier visit for Mother's Day, 1945—she had captured the "fiddledicks" at the fuss made about her.

She asked her newly-sworn-in son, "Harry, if you are president, why can't you shoo all these people away?"

Grandview held an official "Day of mourning." The community of 1200 had put out its flags and lowered to half-staff. Its citizens were not demonstrative, they said they became reconciled last May to losing their most famed inhabitant.

Service Medals Offered to Former Marines - From the headquarters of the marine corps in Washington, D. C., comes word that any person, who between September 8, 1939, and December 31, 1946, served with the marine corps and was discharged honorably or under honorable conditions, is eligible to receive the American Defense Service Medal and/or the World War II Victory Medal.

These men serving with the

marines between September 8, 1939, and December 7, 1941, inclusive, are eligible for the American Defense Service Medal and all persons who served in the marine corps between December 7, 1941, and December 4, 1946, are eligible to receive the World War II Victory Medal.

Former marines desirous of making application for those medals may do so in person or writing to the marine corps recruiting office in Portland after August 1, 1947. A copy of the discharge certificate must be presented when the application is made.
