

Douglas-Coos Area Added to Regions For Elk Hunting

PORTLAND, July 28. — (P) — Final regulations of the State Game Commission today listed the deer season for the entire state between October 1-20 and ruled out a joint deer-elk season for southeastern Oregon.

The elk hunting dates in the southeastern sector were set back to those prevailing for the rest of eastern Oregon — Oct. 25-Nov. 16 — in final session here Saturday.

The bag limit for elk in all open counties will be one bull elk with antlers of three or more points.

Western Oregon's open elk areas were enlarged by adding Douglas and Coos counties for the Oct. 25-Nov. 2 season prevailing in the western part of the state, which includes Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln, and Lane county (except that part south-west of the Siuslaw river). The Coos-Douglas area includes: from the Umpqua River Highway 38 U. S. 101 junction at Reedsport east to Highway 99 at Drain, then south along Highway 99 to Highway 42 at Dillard, then west along Highway 42 to Highway 10 at Coquille.

No special doe tags will be issued for deer and no special elk tags except for an area near Ukiah. In that area, 100 tags will be issued for elk of either sex in a special Dec. 13-16 season.

There were no changes in the Oct. 22-Nov. 2 pheasant season in counties previously announced and Oct. 22-Nov. 9 in Malheur county. Lake and Jefferson counties were added to those to be open to valley quail Oct. 22-Nov. 2. The blue grouse season for Josephine and counties west of the summit of the coast range will be Oct. 1-20.

All counties will be closed to dove hunting except Lake, Klamath, Deschutes, Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Wasco, Sherman, Jefferson, Hood River, Wheeler and Gilliam.

The Three Sisters game refuge was added to those to be opened for hunting. In one change for closed areas, the McKay Creek area of Coos county will be closed to deer hunting but open for elk.

K-C Vote Frauds May go to Courts

WASHINGTON, July 28. — (P) — Republican congressional leaders marked off the Kansas City vote fraud charges today as a court matter and something to talk about in the coming political wars.

Although Senator Kem (R-Mo.) told a reporter he will not reach a decision until later, a Republican leader who declined to be quoted by name said it is his judgment that the issue will not be revived when Congress meets again in January.

Kem had sought Senate approval of a resolution calling for a special investigation of Attorney General Clark's handling of the charges of vote buying and other irregularities which arose as a result of last year's Democratic "purge" primary in the fifth Missouri district.

In that race, President Truman supported Enos A. Axtell, who won over incumbent Rep. Robert C. Slaughter, Axtell, however, lost to Albert Reeves, Jr., a Republican, in the November election.

The charges of Kem and Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) that Clark "whitewashed" the investigation seemed almost certain to be repeated and expanded by Republican orators buying themselves with the 1948 congressional and presidential campaigns.

Three Juveniles Held In Farm Bureau Theft

Three juveniles will be arraigned before County Judge D. N. Busenbark today for breaking into the Douglas County Farm Bureau Exchange July 24, Chief of Police O. A. Kennerly said this morning. The three boys allegedly took rifle shells valued at more than \$12 and an \$8 wrist watch. The boys were arrested by police from descriptions given them by A. J. Townsend, Farm Bureau manager, who had seen them loitering about the store before closing time last Thursday, Kennerly said.

Three From Roseburg Train at Police School

Three Roseburg men are in training at the state police recruit school in the former Marine barracks at Klamath Falls, according to Sgt. Lyle Harrell of the state police here. The men are James R. Davidson, formerly a weighmaster; John Morris Burkhardt and Raymond Ellery Brown, Jr. Harrell said he does not know where the men will be assigned on completion of their training. Additional state police are expected to be assigned to Roseburg, however.

Workers Under Jobless Pay Now Earning Less

Fewer than one-fourth of Oregon's full-time workers recovered by state unemployment compensation earned more than \$3,000 last year, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission announces. This is a considerable reduction from wartime when a third of the full-time wage earners averaged better than \$250 a month. Construction workers nearly doubled from 1945 to 1946. The

ship and aircraft industries declined from 120,000 to 20,000. Payments to unemployed service men and women declined about 23 per cent. During the first half of the current year, readjustment allowances totaled \$4,956,364, as compared to \$6,456,874 in the same period last year. While 2873 jobless veterans transferred their claims to other states, there was an influx of 4040, a balance of 1167 immigrants.

Parmela A. Van Briesen Of Riddle Passes Away

Parmela Ann Van Briesen, 69, resident of Douglas County for 37 years, died after a lingering illness yesterday at the Roseburg Sanitarium. She was born July 13, 1878, in Dale, Ill., and came to Oregon in 1910, first settling in Oakland and later in Riddle, where she was making her home at the time of her death.

Surviving are the widower, Victor, of Riddle, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Roseburg Funeral Home Wednesday, July 30, at 11 A. M., with the Rev. Vernon Klein officiating. Interment will be in the Old Fellows Cemetery in Oakland, Oregon.

EUGENE, Ore., July 28. — (P) — Eugene, which had to cancel its Oregon Trail pageant because of rain Saturday, was lamenting today that it didn't rain enough. The Pageant Association had \$4,000 in rain insurance, collectible if there was 20 of an inch of rainfall between 3 and 9 P. M. The pageant stage was too damp to perform the spectacle in safety — but it only rained .18 of an inch.

Back at the crossroads there are such ready-made political issues as:

1. TAXES. Congress voted twice to trim income taxes \$4,000,000,000. President Truman vetoed both bills. The vetoes stuck. The bills died.

2. LABOR. Congress passed a bill to make unions liable to punishment for many things never before penalized. Organized labor and the President denounced it. Congress made the bill a law over a veto.

3. SPENDING. Republicans and Democrats squabbled all through the session about trimming government expenses.

Mr. Truman asked last January for some \$37,500,000,000 to run the government in the year that began July 1.

The House decided to whack \$6,000,000,000 off the total. The Senate figured \$4,500,000,000 would be enough of a slash. They never did get together and split the difference, even though they were supposed to under the 1946 reorganization law which supposedly streamlined Congress.

Congress did make some big nicks in the budget. But right into the closing hours there were arguments about how big. The

highest Republican estimate was \$4,555,000,000; the lowest Democratic calculation "in the neighborhood" of \$1,000,000,000.

Records of the House Appropriations committee show: Mr. Truman wanted \$37,640,551,555. The House cut \$3,445,971,525, the Senate cut \$2,312,833,545, and what they finally agreed on was \$34,883,441,380 or a reduction of \$2,777,110,155.

4. LIVING COSTS. The lawmakers heard plenty and said plenty about high prices, they didn't do much about them except:

Continue rent controls until next March, with permission for landlords to boost rents 15 per cent in exchange for leases running through all of 1948.

Agree to an investigation. Because of that inquiry, and a wide assortment of others, dozens of senators and representatives won't be stay-at-homes long.

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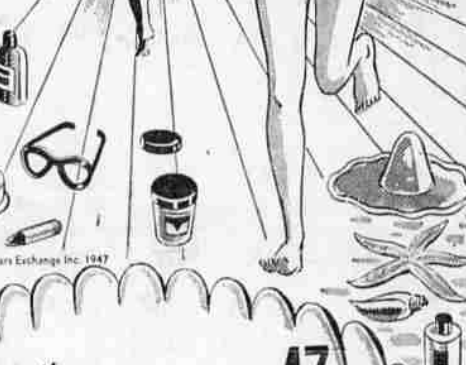
