Alstrom Blanks V. F. W., 5-0, On Four-Hit Hurling

J.V.R. softballers last night shut out Veterans of Foreign Wars 5-0 on Finlay Field, while in the opener Veterans Hospital ran over Squirt, 7-1.

Ernie Alstrom, J.V.R. twirling ace, almost repeated his record of 16 strikeouts of two weeks ago as he retired 13 V.F.W. batters and allowed only five men to reach first base during seven innings of play.

In the first contest, the Hospital and through managers' agreement, employed the services of Wally Wilkins, V.F.W. relief moundman, making the game an exhibition fray with no bearing on league standings.

J.V.R. was never in trouble against V.F.W., as they distributed runs in the first four frames off five hits.

Bus Travis, off Seibert's error, employed some fancy base-running to score after a fly-catch in the first inning, and Sanstead came home in the second after a popout with the sacks filled.

V.F.W. hit in the first and second frames but was retired by Alstrom's speedball mound work.

Don Glenz accounted for the victor's tally in the third with a single which scored Ward Cummings. J.V.R. combined three hits and Larson's miff in the fourth for their final two scores.

Hatten's Shut-Out Job Gives Dodgers 10th Straight Win

Joe Hatten, the stylish southpaw of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who has beaten Chicago six times without a setback this season, needs only three more triumphs over the Cubs to tie the record for most victories over a club in one year.

The record of nine is held by Ed Reulbach of the 1908 Cubs whose victims, strangely enough, were the Dodgers.

Hatten pitched a three-hit 4-0 shutout over his "cousins" yesterday to extend the Dodgers' winning streak to 10 straight. It is the longest winning streak of the season in the National League.

The win enabled the Dodgers to maintain their seven-game lead over the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals who staged one of their customary fast finishes to nip the Boston Braves 8-7, Torgerson homered for the Braves. The Braves dropped to nine games behind the Dodgers and one percentage point behind the third place New York Giants, who lost to Cincinnati, 5-0.

Yankees Stretch Lead

In the only two American League games, the New York Yankees increased their first place margin over the idle Boston Red Sox to 10 games by defeating the Detroit Tigers, 5-1, and the Philadelphia Athletics won over the Chicago White Sox, 5-3.

Johnny Vander Meer, beaten in his last five appearances, handed the Giants their third shutout of the year and also halted the Giants' homer-hitting streak which had gone through 15 straight games, one short of the National League record.

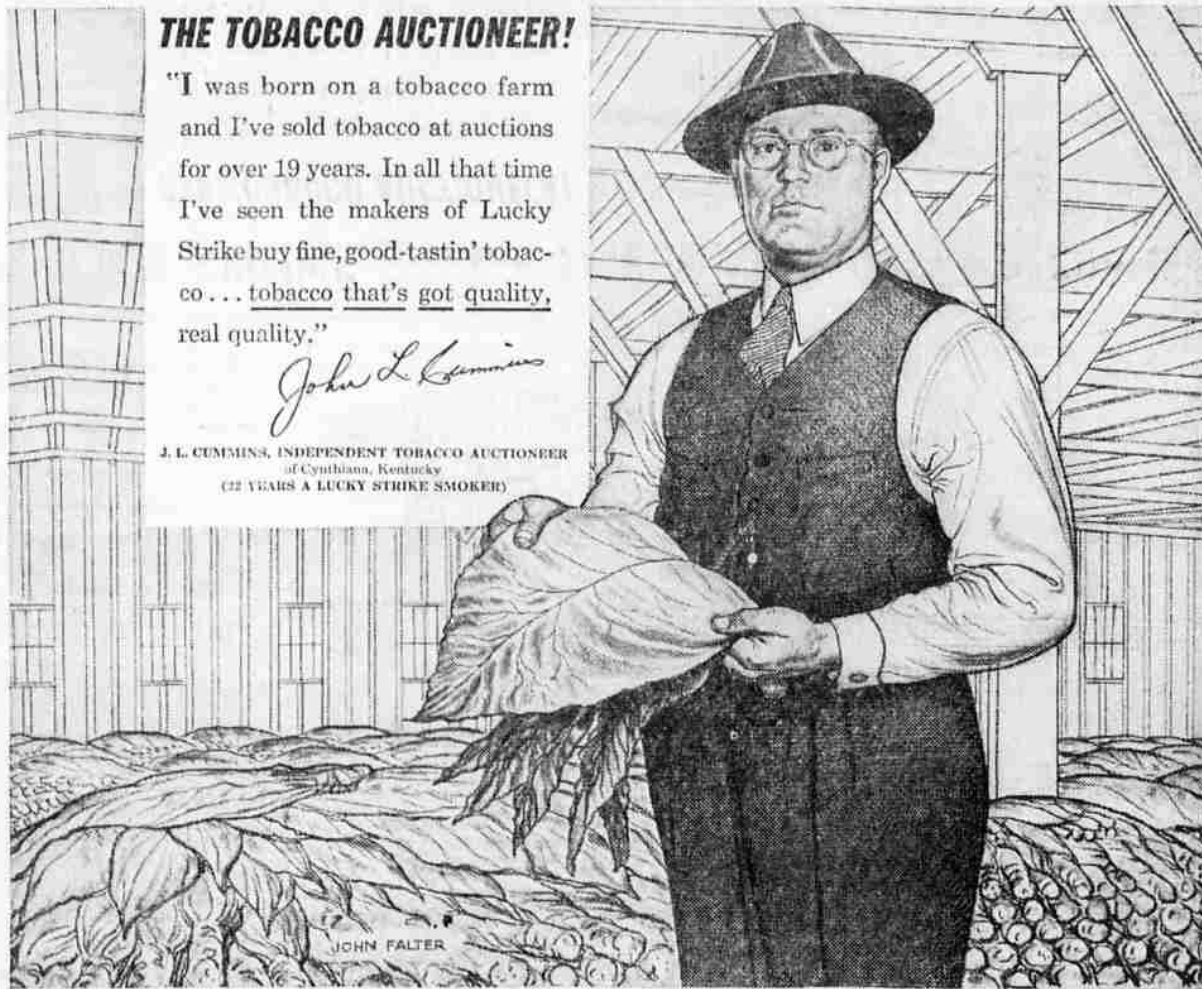
