Dodgers' Rookie Hurler, Taylor, Blanks Cardinals

Flatbush faithful today were exhibiting haste to order World Series tickets, with hardly a soul in Brooklyn holding any doubt over the Dodgers' participation in the October classic.

They had plenty to support their contention. For last night the Dodgers, behind the superb pitching of Rookie Harry Taylor, whipped the St. Louis Cardinals, chief threat to their pennant hopes, 4-0.

Yesterday's victory increased the Dodgers' National League lead over the runner-up Redbirds to eight full games and stretched their current victory string to 11 straight, the highest streak in the league this season.

On the mound, Taylor held the runless Cards to three hits to register his ninth win against three losses. At the plate he drove in the first run in the sixth inning with a squeeze bunt. He batted in two more in the eighth with a tremendous triple and carried the final run in himself a moment later.

Homerun Wins For Giants
The New York Giants remained in third place, nine games behind first, when they nipped the Cincinnati Reds, 2-1. Marshall's 26th home run proved to be the deciding tally.

Held to two hits for six innings, the Chicago Cubs broke loose with a five-run attack in the seventh to defeat Philadelphia, 5-4, for their 13th success in 14 games with the Phils.

Bonham, ex-American League pitcher, won his ninth game against three defeats this season as he pitched the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 6-5 victory over the fourth place Boston Braves.

Feller Beats Sox
The Boston Red Sox dropped to 103 games behind the idle American League leading New York Yankees by losing a 5-1 decision to Feller and the Indians in Boston.

Philadelphia's fourth place Athletics outscored the Chicago White Sox, 5-2. Hank Majeski, A's third baseman, was beamed by a pitched ball from Harris in the fourth inning and was carried from the field on a stretcher. The extent of the injury has not yet been determined.

The St. Louis Browns walloped the Senators, 8-2.
The Detroit Tigers and Yankees enjoyed an off day.

Hilt Posts 7-to-1 Win Over Chiefs

Umpqua Chiefs baseball club fell to third spot in Southern Oregon League play Sunday, dropping a 7-1 decision to a steamed-up Hilt, Calif., nine. All other games of the circuit were rained out.

Sunday next the Chiefs provide opposition at Central Point in the second half of round robin play in an attempt to avenge the 4-1 drubbing the Pointers handed out here July 4.

Central Point, composed mainly of last year's Rogue Club of Medford, holds fourth place on the league ladder with 5 wins and losses, while the Chiefs are currently hanging onto a record of 6 wins and 4 losses.

Errors by the Chiefs, plus a homerun by Hilt's Bob Trincea, proved costly Sunday as they could get only one man across

the plate. Hilt ran in a single score in the fourth and added three in each the sixth and eighth frame off four hits combined with Roseburg misplays.

Drastic Rules for Duck Season Slated

WASHINGTON, July 30.—(AP)—The Fish and Wildlife Service indicated today that duck-hunters will encounter the most drastic shooting rules in a decade this fall—regulations reminiscent of the duck-depression mid-thirties.

The agency is keeping its autumn marsh-mauling schedule secret until President Truman and Secretary of the Interior Krug approve them, but those acquainted with the waterfowl situation predict that the season will be cut to 30 days. It was 45 days last fall, and 80 days in 1945.

Fredrick C. Lincoln, assistant to the director of the Fish and Wildlife Service, said the regulations have been completed and are now under consideration by the Justice Department, Budget Bureau and other agencies concerned. They may be made public as early as next Friday or Monday, he said.

Lincoln acknowledged that reductions beyond the 1946 season, bag limit, possession limit and shooting hours virtually would mean the return of the hunting conditions of 1935 and 1936, during the duck depression.

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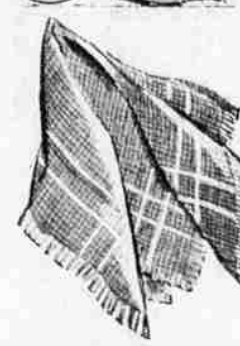
