Douglas Leads Western Oregon In Wage Records

Horace Greeley's century-old advice of "Go West, Young Man" is being hunted for able-bodied Oregonians reversing for those elusive, inflated postwar wages. For figures compiled by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission show that record earnings now are being reported from Eastern Oregon counties, where loggers and mill men are working feverishly to bring the lumber supply up to reconversion demands. Practically every one of the dozen "high wage" counties are predominantly lumber producers, but Harney, Jefferson and Wheeler lead all the rest with average monthly earnings of \$287.01; \$257.71; and \$261.45 respectively for the first quarter of 1947. Next come the western Oregon trio of Douglas, Coos and Polk with \$246.61; \$245.40; and \$241.81, while Crook, Tillamook, Lake, Multnomah, Linn and Columbia are well above the state-wide average of \$226.

The average monthly pay for about 278,000 workers (of whom 64,500 are in the lumber industry) has increased by 15.3 per cent over a year ago, and is even higher than during the war when over-time shipyard work swelled pay envelopes. First quarter wage payments by 14,000 employers were three times pre-war totals for 1939-40-41, and the average monthly check has doubled.

Every county in Oregon has bigger pay rolls than in the last year before Pearl Harbor, while two—Josephine and Douglas—report increases of 604 and 53 per cent respectively. Linn and Jefferson have more than quadrupled wage totals, and Tillamook, Malheur, Jackson, Morrow, Umatilla, Marion, Benton and Lane have gains of more than 250 per cent. Although Multnomah is the only county with lower pay rolls than during the war, its employers paid but \$86 millions in the first three months of 1947 as compared with \$38 millions in 1941.

Jersey Dairymen Seek Revision of Milk Price Rules

PORTLAND, July 31.—A new committee of Jersey cattle dairymen was listed today to direct efforts of the milk producers' group seeking revision of the state milk price schedule. State Agriculture Director Peterson defended the existing payment plan in a meeting here yesterday with members of the Milk Producers Association in which the owners of high butterfat producing herds complained of discrimination.

Peterson said "the new plan reimburses owners of all breeds alike for butterfat and milk solids they supply to the market. If this is discrimination, I fail to see it." The state director invited the Jersey breeders to compile statistical proof of their complaint, adding that he would be glad to discuss the issue with "reasonable, intelligent men." "I have heard rumors political pressure may be brought to bear on me. Anyone who thinks that will work had better think again," he asserted.

Peterson recommended a committee representing producers, distributors and consumers, but the association later named an all-producer committee. Paul Feeder, Sauvie Island, was named chairman.

Heat Wave Breaks In Some Sections

(By The Associated Press) The summer's first real heat wave was broken in most sections of the nation today, and relief was promised within 24 hours for areas still sweating it out—except for the somewhat too sunny South.

Near the Ohio river temperatures remained high, but the U. S. weather bureau said cooler weather should move in to the area later today. Temperatures already were considerably cooler in northern Illinois, Indiana and Missouri and all of Iowa, but from those states southward no heat relief was in sight.

The Midwest was promised a continuation of the cool spell for at least another day.

Warm, humid weather working its way through the Eastern states was expected to be replaced by cooler temperatures by tomorrow, from New England as far south as Virginia.

However, a warming trend was reported in the Western plains states, which have already experienced the cool spell now moving eastward, and the hotter air mass was expected to begin following on the cool weather's heels in a day or two.

Scattered thundershowers were forecast for the upper Ohio valley, in New England and along the Gulf coast today.
