General Motors Boosts Passenger Auto Prices

DETROIT, Aug. 1.—(AP)—General Motors Corp. today announced a two to six per cent increase in the list prices of all passenger cars effective immediately.

Cadillac, Buick, Oldsmobile, Pontiac and Chevrolet passenger cars were affected.

President C. E. Wilson said the company's first general price boost since last November was necessitated because "increased costs of both labor and materials are now too great for General Motors to possibly absorb."

He cited what he termed a 12 per cent increase in labor costs because of April's wage agreement with the CIO United Auto Workers, as well as rising costs of steel, pig iron and other materials.

Mrs. McNary Will Open Tea Room, Antique Shop

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Mrs. Charles L. McNary, widow of ex-U. S. Senator Charles L. McNary, plans to open a tea room and antique shop at Fir Cones, the McNary farm near here.

The plans were disclosed in a letter to the Marion County Court in which she asked about regulations and restrictions on such shops.

The court said it knew of none to hold back her plans.

Work of Oregon Chest Related at Lions Club Meet

H. C. Johnson of Albany, director of the Oregon Chest, who passed through Roseburg last night, paused long enough to give the Lions Club an eight-minute talk on the nine agencies which compose the Oregon Chest.

These agencies include the Boys and Girls Aid Society, Catholic Charities, Children's Farm Home of the W. C. T. U., Oregon Protective Society, Salvation Army Home, Volunteers of America, and the Waverly Baby Home.

The agencies of the Oregon Chest cared for 2,992 children who are "misfits" in the social world last year. A total of 428,768 days' care was given them. Total expenditures last year were \$739,885.08, of which 43 per cent came from the Oregon Chest, he said.

Johnson praised the work of the Salvation Army's White Shield Home at Portland, where unmarried mothers may go for care without social stigma being cast on their pregnancy.

The girls at the White Shield Home are protected in every way and knowledge of their plight held in strictest confidence, Johnson pointed out. Last year, 11 girls from Douglas County were cared for at the home.

The Oregon Chest is a continuation of the Oregon War Chest, which collected funds for 30 agencies including the USO. Leo Young, Roseburg, will act as county chairman of the 1947 campaign in October.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Leon Winfield Jones, 43-year-old carpenter who has been sought under murder warrants for the slaying of two men at an Indian camp party July 20, was taken into custody 10 miles from the Gerstle River camp where the slayings occurred. U. S. Marshall Stanley J. H. Nichols said today.

Jones' wife and three children live in Vancouver, Wash. The two victims were Donald R. Harris, 33, Big Delta construction worker, and Carl Ahnstrom, 68, long-time Alaska trapper and prospector.

PITTSBURGH, July 31.—(AP)—Truck Drivers James and Robert Gray, members of the A.F.L. Teamsters Union, don't have far to go to take up their picketing duties in the 49-day old household movers' strike.

The Gray brothers are picketing their father who—with two other sons, William and Carl—runs a moving business here.

"Two of the boys go to the carriers' meetings," says Father Gray, "and two attend union meetings. Yet we manage to keep it level and in good humor."

Tighter Rules Presage Smaller Waterfowl Kill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Cutting the nation's duck-hunting season to a 10-year low, the Fish and Wildlife Service predicted today a "very substantial reduction" in the kill of waterfowl this year.

The agency which controls the sportsman's trigger finger reduced the shooting of ducks and geese to 30 days in the East and 35 days in the Central and Western states. This is the shortest season since the duck-depression years of the mid-thirties.

The new regulations also shortened each hunting day by an hour, and clamped new limitations on the number of waterfowl a hunter may kill in one day or accumulate in more than a day. Furthermore no hunter may keep his catch in storage for more than 90 days after the season's ending.

The earliest seasons begin Sept. 1, in Alaska and some northern states.

President Truman signed a proclamation yesterday making the 1947 rules effective.

'Poor' Season Forecast
Acting Secretary of the Interior Oscar L. Chapman said "reductions in the hunting season and bag limits are necessary this year to stem the noticeable decrease in waterfowl over the past three years."

"If the sport of wildfowling is to continue, we must regulate the take to less than the season's increase."

Club Liquor Licenses Denied Vets and Lodges
Portland, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Eleven veterans and fraternal organizations were notified today that they could not have club liquor licenses, but would be considered for restaurant and service licenses.

The State Liquor Control commission said the latter type of license—issued to establishments open to the public—would be granted to the 11 organizations if they met requirements. Club licenses are given where establishments serve only members.

The rejected applicants for club licenses included the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Klamath Falls; Veterans of Foreign Wars Veterans Club, Freewater; and the American Legion Capital Post, No. 9, Salem.

New Process Increases Strength of Lumber

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 1.—(AP)—A new process for increasing the structural strength of lumber, developed by Del Schweiger of Colorado, has been recognized by the Department of Forestry of the Colorado A and M College, and by Professor O'Day of the U. of Wyoming, Schweiger, now in Grants Pass, announced today.

The new process has also been approved by the Charter Institute of American Inventors.

A small-scale plant using the new process has been established in the county, Schweiger said, but he declined to give the location because the process is not fully protected.

The new development makes it possible to take green lumber and in a total processing time of 33 hours evaporate it to a
