BOSTON, Aug. 1. — (AP) — Elliott Roosevelt said today that next Monday in Washington "I'll say my piece" before a Senate committee investigating war con-

tracts awarded Panemaker Howard Hughes and Shipbuilder Henry J. Kaiser.

The son of the late president told newsmen at Boston airport that he was not subpoenaed but had been asked to appear before the committee by Sen. Owen Brewster.

Sen. Pepper (D-Fla.) declared yesterday that Roosevelt had grounds for purportedly pushing wartime construction of a Hughes photo-reconnaissance plane and also remarked:

"I have no doubt that it will be shown Elliott Roosevelt accepted entertainment from representatives of Hughes."

Asked about that, Roosevelt answered:

"I'll say my piece when I reach Washington."

No representative of the Indonesian government has arrived here yet. A dispatch from Batavia, however, quoted A. K. Gani, deputy premier of the Indonesian Republic, as expressing the belief that his government would accept mediation conditionally.

Gani, a prisoner of the Dutch, said the Indonesians probably would demand that the Dutch return to them the areas occupied during the fighting before they would agree to mediation.

New Bloodshed Occurs In Palestine Disorder

JERUSALEM, Aug. 1. — (AP) — A British regimental headquarters here was attacked today with grenades and mortars and one attacker was killed, while in Tel Aviv several Jews were reported wounded by gunfire from a British armored car which created panic among a funeral procession of 5,000 Jews.

Two suspected attackers were captured alive. No casualties among the British were announced.

In Tel Aviv, private sources said three bursts of gunfire from an armored car manned by policemen wounded several persons in the funeral procession for five Jewish victims of reprisal shootings last night. A score of Jews were wounded in last night's shootings, which a reliable source attributed to "Tommy" bent on revenge for the hanging by Irgun Zvai Leumi, Jewish underground organization, of two British sergeants at Natanya.

SALISBURY, Eng., Aug. 1. — (AP) — A 32-year-old Church of England clergyman was arraigned yesterday on a charge of bigamy, marrying an attractive ex-service woman in what he described as "a period of my life that I cannot account for" as a result of nerve-shattering war experiences.

He was the Rev. Charles H. C. Lamb, an RAF chaplain at Malta during the heavy bombing. The woman was Joan Boddie, 29, former corporal in the Women's Auxiliary Air Forces.

Mrs. Lamb, whom the clergyman married in 1941, was with him in the courtroom when he pleaded innocent. He was committed for trial and released in \$200 bail. She told reporters she was confident Lamb was telling the truth and said she would stand by him.

Bubble Gum, Pop Bad For Teeth, Dentist Warns

BOSTON, Aug. 1. — (AP) — A kid with a face of bubble gum is headed for the dentist's chair, an oral surgeon warned today.

And that goes for soft drinks, too.

"The sugar in bubble gum and soft drinks probably is responsible for more bad teeth in children today than any other factor," said Dr. Van B. Dalton of Cincinnati at the 29th convention of the American Society of Oral Surgeons.

He said a study of Cincinnati children showed that addicts of pop and bubble gum developed 50 per cent more cavities than those from whom the delicacies were withheld.

tributed to a week-long walkout of 7,000 Murray Corp. of America workers in a demand for contract protection against the "union liability" provision of the Taft-Hartley law, Murray Corp. supplies parts to the industry.

Compromise Offered

The same UAW-CIO demand on Ford was refused bluntly, but Ford, acknowledging a "critical situation," offered a compromise.

This was in the form of a company pledge not to bring suit against the union for damages arising out of "illegal strikes" provided that:

1. The union has not "inspired or authorized such a strike."

2. The union agrees "promptly to denounce publicly" an illegal strike.

3. The union and its "officers or agents" agree to use "prompt and honest effort" to prevent or end such a strike.

4. The impartial umpire (assigned by contract) shall be "final judge" of whether the union has taken "these reasonable steps" relative to such strikes.

has refused to cooperate with the Republican-controlled Congress.

Taft said the Republican party's domestic policies "will always be sabotaged and opposed by a Democratic executive administration." He added that the only way to "do the job as it should be done" and also correct the present foreign policy is to elect a Republican president next year. He predicted the people "will do so."

Listeners Surprised

Taft's jibes at the administration's foreign policy came as a surprise to some of his listeners, in view of the leadership for bipartisan cooperation on this front taken by Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), a possible rival in the 1948 national convention. However, none would comment for publication.

Taft, asserting he is "not happy about the country's foreign policy," said the United States, through agreements made by the late President Roosevelt at Tehran and Yalta and by Mr. Truman at Potsdam "practically abandoned all the ideals for which the war was fought."

"We created an impossible situation," he said, "in which freedom is suppressed throughout large sections of Europe and Asia."
