(peace of Britain). Both stemmed
from the same cause.

In her heyday, Rome was busi-
ly occupied with her own domes-
tic development. Wars here and
there interrupted and retarded
her home development program. So, when wars threat-
ened, Rome knocked the heads of
the belligerents together and made
them be good.

Britain, through the peak of
her commercial greatness, fol-
lowed the same pattern.

If there is to be a Pax Americana
(peace of America), we must
do likewise.

History offers this conclusion:
While Rome and Britain were
compelling a reasonable sem-
blance of peace throughout the
world, they were relatively pros-
perous and happy at home.

Peace, however achieved, is
profitable.

DON'T jump to wrong conclu-
sions. Britain isn't turning
tail and running pell-mell for cov-
er. With less than 40 million peo-
ple, her present armed strength is
ABOVE a million men. With
140 million people, our present
armed strength is BELOW a mil-
lion. In proportion to her num-
bers, Britain is staying stronger
than we are.

AUSTERITY or no austerity, the
British have decided on a big
traditional wedding, with a long
period of lavish rejoicing, for
Princess Elizabeth and her blue-
blooded navy spouse-to-be. If
necessary, they'll pull their personal
belts a hole tighter to pay for it.

People everywhere are more or
less alike. We love pomp and
splending and we dread economy.

IN her need for more dollars to
pay her food bills, Britain is
planning to cut her imports of
American tobacco and American
movies—both "luxuries." When
people start cutting out luxuries,
they mean business.

IN the way of movies, the British
are cutting with a two-edged
knife. They are planning to buy
less of ours and at the same time
are making MORE OF THEIR
OWN.

British movies are beginning to
click, even in this country.

"Henry V," adapted for the screen
by Sir Laurence Olivier and
produced by J. Arthur Rank, Brit-
ain's new celluloid tycoon, has al-
ready earned \$650,000 in its show-
ings in this country, and before it
is through in America the Rank
organization expects it to earn a
total of \$10,000,000.

That isn't piker money.

SPEAKING of movies, Betty
Grable last year earned more
than her boss. She was paid a to-
tal of \$299,333, whereas the big
shot of 20th Century Fox got only
\$255,922 and his top hired hand
(Darryl F. Zanuck) got \$260,000.

Note that these salaries were
paid for ENTERTAINING us.
Those who feed, clothe and house
us are less liberally rewarded.

Like everybody else, we pay
highest for what we want most.

THESE salaries are high. They
are made possible by our pa-
tronage. Also our old uncle with
the whiskers takes a staggering
cut out of them at tax-paying
time. To that extent, the movie
moguls are working for us. The
more taxes they pay, the less we
little people have to pay.

(Even after taxes they have
enough to eat and swimming
pools to keep clean in. All Amer-
icans have enough to eat. Swim-
ming pools are the modern hall-
mark of success, as horses and a
carriage used to be.)

OFF TO A MEETING

We're off to attend a district convention of the Oregon
Wildlife Federation. Some of our readers doubtless would
say we're off—period. But we'll not go into that at present.

Our meeting is to be held at the beautiful coastal city of
Taft. Gathered there Saturday and Sunday will be a group
of men who can match us yarn for yarn about the big ones
that got away, or even outdo us in exaggerating actual
catches or kills. It's a real test of mental alertness to keep
pace with those whoopie-yarners, particularly the city
sneakers from the Multnomah Anglers & Hunters Club.

If our Taft meeting follows the usual pattern there will
be verbal dog-fights over pet theories, a good deal of cussing
and discussing of the Game Commission, the Fish Commis-
sion, the Legislature, conservation, high dams, flood con-
trol, pollution, and so on.

Usually there are as many ideas at a sportsmen's conven-
tion as there are sportsmen in attendance, and every man
is an expert in his own right—and he's always right. He'll
pound the table to convince you he's right, and if he misses
the table and hits your eye it isn't always an accident.

We like these conventions because they are so democratic
and because occasionally we win arguments by shouting
louder than the majority of the delegates, due to our drill
sergeant training in the first World War.

But, honestly—for we're afraid we've exaggerated con-
siderably (just getting in training)—we know of no group
which takes its meetings more seriously than the compara-
tively few men organized to represent the state's anglers
and hunters.

The Oregon Wildlife Federation is not composed ex-
clusively of sportsmen's organizations. It includes civic and
service clubs, Izaak Walton Chapters, Sports Councils, etc.
Membership is open to any organizations, groups or in-
dividuals interested in conservation of natural resources.

We have had word from Jim Loder, Salem, state presi-
dent, that the principal topic for this district meeting will
be conservation of our timber resource. Particular emphasis
will be given sustained yield forest management, wood waste
utilization, cooperation with Keep Oregon Green and other
fire prevention agencies.

Much thought will be given rules and regulations aiding
fish and game management, to preserve for the future the
recreational resources of streams and lakes.

It is a sincere and earnest group of men who attend these
meetings. They gather from all parts of the state at con-
siderable personal expense. They leave their respective
businesses, frequently incurring loss of revenue.

Our sportsmen's groups and their leaders have often been
called "radicals." They have been roundly abused upon
occasions, particularly by those interests who are reaping
profits from a resource belonging to a general public which
fails to realize the value of the asset it is permitting private
interest to exploit and destroy.

The battle waged by sportsmen has been long, exhausting
and, at times, vicious. Small organizations first lifted their
voices against wanton destruction of fish, game, forests
and watersheds. Weak and unorganized, they had little
effect. But gradually they added to their ranks. Izaak Wal-
ton Chapters began to have influence locally and nationally.
The Wildlife Federation came into existence in 1931 and
brought many independent groups, service and civic clubs,
women's clubs, etc., into the conservation campaign.

The protective influence of sportsmen's organizations is
more effective today. Sportsmen are resisting destruction
of Western public domain by ruthless stockmen. Demands
by sports groups have enforced some modification of plans
by Army Engineers to impound all running water to com-
plete the already advanced destruction of fish life. Vigilance
and demand have resulted in more effective fish and game
management in the various states. In California and Wash-
ington, where sportsmen are better organized than in Ore-
gon, conservation is considerably advanced over the Oregon
program.

Only a small fraction of Oregon's licensed hunters and
anglers hold membership in their nearest sportsmen's clubs.
Yet, with nearly 50,000 members in organized groups, it
has been possible in recent years to greatly improve con-
servation in Oregon. When all sportsmen awaken to the
importance of organization and lend their dollars and in-
fluence to the task now developing upon a sincere and
earnest few, willing to sacrifice time and money for the
cause, we will have little difficulty in obtaining manage-
ment of our natural resources for public rather than private
benefit.

Explanation Offered
For 'Umpqua' Origin

Your editorial of July 8, relative
to the origin of the word
Umpqua, carries in my mind un-
til I am impelled to mention a
few facts.

The chances are that the metro-
politan reporter to whom you
faciously refer did not origi-
nate his idea.

He probably received his infor-
mation from G. W. Riddle, who
was interviewed occasionally by
reporters seeking material on
Oregon history.

Mr. Riddle came to what is
now Glenbrook Farm, near Rid-
dle, in 1851, at the age of eleven.
At that time the nearest white
family was eight miles away.

He soon learned the Chinook
jargon well enough to become an
interpreter between the settlers,
who began to arrive in 1852, and
the Indians.

Ump was quah, accent on the
last syllable, was the Indian call
when he wished to cross a stream
and a boat was on the other side.
That was Mr. Riddle's opinion of
how the name originated.

Please do not entertain the
thought that the pioneers were

paid for such favors as helping
persons across a stream. It was
an act of altruism.

Mr. Hermann and Mr. Riddle
discussed this subject, but I heard
nothing of the word meaning
thunder. However, I am willing
to give credence to any origin
that can be verified.

NORTH BEND, Ore., Aug. 2.—
(AP)—Jack Hudson, 21-year-old
student pilot, was feeling all
right today but the plane which
he landed in a cow pasture needs
a new propeller.

All available aircraft in the
vicinity hunted for him Thurs-
day when he was gone over-
laid. He returned at 8:45 P. M.
after hitchhiking from Reedsport.

Ken Hartberg, under whom
Hudson was taking instruction,
said the young pilot reported hit-
ting a downdraft as he approach-
ed the ranch of his uncle, Ed
Blondel, 20 miles upriver from
Reedsport. The plane hopped
over a couple of fences, touched
with one wheel, and nosed up.

Hudson was unhurt and his un-
cle drove him to Reedsport.

Camper Escapes,
Grizzly Takes Pack

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 2.—
(AP)—A big grizzly bear that
carried off his 70-pound pack as

last night, W. K. Orendorff's
Mount McKinley Park vacation.

The Fairbanks Weather Bureau
forecaster related that he was
awakened in his sleeping bag by
what seemed to be a wheezing
cough. He was staring up into
the face of the grizzly.

Orendorff said he rolled cau-
tiously away in his bag, then
jumped out of it and threw it at
the bear. Then he picked up a
frying pan and hammered it with
a rock on the theory that a
grizzly would run from a clamor
in the night.

Orendorff still has doubts about
the efficacy of his theory, but any-
how the grizzly picked up his
pack, containing clothing, candy
bars and food, and disappeared.

With his taste for camping out-
doored, Orendorff headed back for
Fairbanks. Anyhow, he explained,
his frying pan wouldn't have
been fit to fry his breakfast
bacon in.
