SUTHERLIN—Construction of a one story stucco building will be completed by Peter Winters soon on his property west of Sutherlin on West Central Avenue. The building will be used as a United Petroleum service station and will be run by Mr. Winters and his son.

Carl S. Bringle has nearly completed a new stucco Shell Service station west of the Drive-in-Market and expects to have it open for business shortly.

Reedsport

REEDSPORT — Negotiations have been completed for purchase of 17 acres of land by the Reedsport School District at the southwest outskirts of the city for a new high school site, according to R. J. Hubbard. The land is reported to cost \$20,000.

Demand is exceeding supply of canned pilchard at the Reedsport Packing Plant, according to Joe Kahler. Operating for the past six weeks with a full crew of employees, the firm's canned supply of domestic type sardines has already been contracted with California and eastern wholesalers.

Construction of an "on the spot" sawmill is being proposed by Russell J. Hubbard and son, John Hubbard, on the Kalawatset Ranch near here. Having access to considerable second growth timber, the operators plan to convert the timber to lumber on the spot.

A new city route for lumber and log hauling is being laid out by City Manager Cecil Bennett for hauling to and from the Bridge Lumber Company mill and Port of Umpqua dock. The Port of Umpqua is also arranging to build a new roadway on their property and a city street west of the highway, making their property more accessible to heavy hauling.

City Manager Cecil Bennett returned from California by plane Tuesday where he purchased for Reedsport an Austin Western 8-ton tandem street roller and a Standard steel, 600-gallon oiling distributor. The whole outfit cost the city \$4700, less freight.

U. S. to Keep 60 Plants Ready For Wartime Use

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The War Department plans to keep 60 complete government-owned industrial plants ready for immediate specialized production in event of another war.

Secretary of War Royall made public a report covering the department's plans to "have in stock, or to provide by prompt production in our arsenals and standby plants, sufficient material to resist an aggressor during the first stage."

The 60 plants, worth \$2,301,348,000 would cost \$25,122,000 to maintain but Royall pointed out this amount may be reduced substantially if the plants are leased out for civilian use.
