

Turkey Marketing To Be Promoted By Special Levy

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9.—An advertising fund to promote increased marketings of Oregon turkeys will be raised through a special levy of 1 cent a bird on all turkeys sold in commercial channels this year.

Arrangements for processors to collect the cent levy were

made with directors of the Oregon Turkey Improvement Association at a meeting here Thursday. Processors will deduct the 1 cent a bird from the producer's return and remit the amounts collected to the association. Those producers unwilling to contribute may obtain refunds from the association secretary.

First marketings of the 1947 Oregon turkey crop are scheduled to start next week. Plans were made at the meeting for a campaign to obtain greater consumption of turkeys in Labor day weekend festivities.

Truman Names 4 To Administer Housing Agency

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—(P)—President Truman yesterday named Cyrus S. Ching to head up the government's new independent mediation service under the Taft-Hartley act.

The appointment of Ching, public relations adviser for the U. S. Rubber Company, was announced at a news conference at which the president also named Raymond Foley of Michigan as administrator of the Housing and Home Finance Agency under provisions of reorganization plan No. 3 approved last month by the Senate.

Franklin D. Richards of Utah, commissioner of the Federal Housing Administration.

Dillon S. Myer of Ohio, commissioner of the Public Housing Administration.

The president, in announcing the new set-up which groups all the principal housing functions of the government under one Housing and Home Finance Agency, said "the primary responsibility for meeting the nation's housing needs rests, and must continue to rest, with private industry."

However he added:

"But the federal government also has the responsibility of assisting and stimulating the efforts of private industry to provide much-needed homes."

AUGUSTA, Me., Aug. 11.—(P)—Senator Brewster charged today that Howard Hughes had six times urged his Senate committee to call off an investigation of war contracts with the million-dollar plane manufacturer's firm.

Brewster's statement came in answer to an accusation by Hughes in Washington that the Senator was "too cowardly" to continue the investigation.

"Mr. Hughes started this personal phase of it. I suggested he come in and make charges under oath which I would answer."

"He was on two or three hours at a time for several days. Six times he urged the committee, and I quote 'I earnestly urge the committee to drop this matter right here.'"

"It seemed to me he was crying 'enough' and throwing in the sponge. That concluded it so far as I am concerned."

Claims Public Support

As Hughes left the hearing, there was a burst of applause from many who had stood around outside the closed doors waiting for a glimpse of the man who has been the central figure in the Senate's most sensational hearings in years.

Col. James G. Hall, former chief of army air corps photo reconnaissance, today labeled the Senate investigation of Hughes' plane contracts "a skunk circus which has been stinking up the entire nation."

Hall made this statement to reporters after accusing the Senate War Investigating committee of refusing to allow him to reply to testimony that John W. Meyer, Hughes' free-spending publicity man, spent \$3,732.77 on entertainment of Hall and his associates over approximately three years.

Hall, now an aviation consultant, called a news conference shortly after the committee had recessed its investigation until Nov. 17.

He acknowledged accepting entertainment from Hughes and Meyer, but said he never permitted this to influence him in connection with an \$18,000,000 contract for photo reconnaissance planes awarded to Hughes on the recommendation of Elliott Roosevelt, son of the late President Roosevelt and Hall's predecessor in the air corps photo reconnaissance post.

Asked what his reaction to the hearing was, Hall replied:

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Libel Suit Coming

Russell Birdwell, Hollywood publicity man, said today he will file a \$1,000,000 libel suit against Noah Dietrich, official of the Hughes Tool Company, because of testimony which Dietrich gave a Senate subcommittee inquiring into plane contracts awarded to Howard Hughes.

Birdwell, who said he had been called to testify before the Senate subcommittee, said he was investigating subcommittee this morning, denied at a news conference that he falsified an expense account, as Dietrich testified last week.

Dietrich, executive vice president of the tool company, told the committee that Birdwell, then working for Hughes, admitted to him that he never entertained Jesse Jones, as he claimed in an expense account.

Birdwell said he has instructed his attorney, Charles D. Canlon, New York City, to file the libel suit.

Widow of Last Kaiser Dies at 60

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—(P)—Princess Hermine, widow of Germany's last Kaiser, Wilhelm II, died Thursday at Frankfurt-am-Main, in the Russian zone of Germany, the Soviet-controlled German news agency reported. She was 60.

Princess Hermine had lived in retirement since the death of the former Kaiser, the Exile of Doorn, in June, 1941.

Hitler telegraphed her condolences upon the death of Wilhelm.

She told American reporters at her six-room apartment in Frankfurt last April that the former Kaiser "despised and distrusted" Hitler even during the height of the Nazi leader's western front successes in 1940.

Hermine, left a widow with five children as the Princess of Schoenach-Carolath, at the age of 32, was married to Wilhelm II in 1922 and lived with him in The Netherlands until he died.

Truman Orders Exhibit To Settle Budget Tilt

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—(P)—President Truman's entry into the battle of the budget bolstered evidence today that federal spending this fiscal year—as the administration adds it up—will be close to the original White House estimates of \$37,500,000,000.

Taking an indirect poke at claims of big savings by the Republican Congress, Mr. Truman announced that he has ordered a "detailed and exhaustive" study of federal outlays and income.

When this is completed he will issue a review and analysis of "all the facts."
