Confirmation of the death in the line of duty of Private First Class Theodore A. Wallace, above, was received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Troy A. Wallace, Myrtle Creek, this week from Senator Guy Cordon.

Wallace's body was found Aug. 12, 1945, in the Busuanga River between San Jose and Adela, Mindoro, Philippine Islands, and taken for fingerprint identification to the Army headquarters in Manila.

Born June 15, 1921, at The Dalles, Ore., Wallace was a graduate of Myrtle Creek High School. He enlisted in the Army Oct. 26, 1945, serving with the 96th Infantry Division in the Leyte campaign and at Okinawa, where he was wounded but returned to duty.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Rosa A. Wallace, Walla Walla, Wash.; his parents, and two sisters, Mrs. Louella Zimmers and Miss Lavina Wallace, Myrtle Creek.

His body, at present interned in the U. S. Army Memorial Cemetery No. 2, Manila, Philippine Islands, will be shipped to Myrtle Creek for reburial.

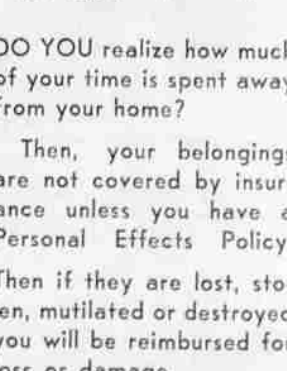
Back From Eugene—David J. McCarroll, of Stearns, Flynn and Company, has returned to his office in Roseburg, from a business trip to Eugene.
