Jesus lived amid savage hatreds, bitter tempers, and a fanatical zeal for comparatively trivial things. The scribes counted six hundred and thirteen different rules for living. Grades of Oregon Wool Governed by Varied Climate

SALEM, Aug. 14.—(P)—An announcement that a price improvement was especially noticeable in finer grades of wool on the U. S. market the first week in August brings up the question among Oregon sheepmen: What makes a fleece finer?

A poor shearer, he points out, can turn a desirable staple fleece into short staple. Pointers on Fleece "Quality or character of fleeces," he writes, "are those attributes hard to define but all important to the trade. They reflect clean ranges and surroundings, abundance of feed for the full year, absence of kemp or hair, those coarse fibres found around the top of neck and flanks. (They are not wool and refuse to felt, weave or dye like wool.) They also show no break or weak spots in the fibre, absence of undesirable marking fluid that will not scour out readily, and the general attractiveness of the fleece."

Stewart advises good tying, with the attractive neck and Climate is Factor "Climate conditions are so varied in Oregon," writes Stewart, "that no one type of sheep is suited to all sections of the state. Fortunately the breeding of sheep has gone past the trial and error stage and we know what types are best suited to the varied climatic and range conditions existing in Oregon."

"The coast counties having excessive seasonal rainfall have found that the mutton breeds, carrying lighter coarser fleeces, are suited to their needs. Farther east we find the heavier fleeced coarse wools and crossbred sheep doing well, and on the high semi-arid ranges of Eastern Oregon we find the fine wool breeds doing exceptionally well."

Having selected breed and good stock, the woolman should practice selective culling, always remembering that today's meat demand affords a ready market for individuals not wanted for wool production.

Fleeces with the least shrink-

age, generally speaking, are the most valuable, Stewart maintains, urging that wool be clean from foreign matter, although the lanolin, fat natural to good wool, is easily-removed, valuable as a by-product and so not undesirable.

Shoulder wool on the outside, where it will be readily visible to purchasers and where it will help to hold the fleece together as a unit, "If Oregon had been first in price per pound last year instead of fifth," he declares, "the additional income to the grower would have been \$272,000. This with practically no added expense of production.
