Roseburg-Eugene Coaxial Cable Is 50-Mile Stretch

Approximately 50 miles of coaxial cable have been placed underground between Roseburg and Eugene since the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company's cable-laying train began plowing here on May 21, according to R. J. Henwood, local manager for the company.

Except for an eight-mile section north of the North Umpqua River, and a few other points where cable had not yet been delivered, plowing operations were completed to Eugene about July 18.

Since then, Henwood said, the train returned to complete the Umpqua section and then was moved to the California line, where ground rooting work now is under way.

Second Cable Slated—A second cable train is slated to begin plowing between Eugene and Salem next week and is expected to complete that section within six weeks or two months.

From Salem to Portland the cable will be placed in existing underground conduit.

Roseburg, Henwood said, is an important station on the coaxial route, the voice repeaters and other control and terminating equipment to be installed in the new \$400,000 office now under construction.

Contractors already have completed an underground conduit system to carry the cable through the city.

As previously announced, the coaxial cable will follow a route roughly paralleling the Pacific Highway from Portland to the California line. Expected to cost in excess of \$9,000,000, it is the state's largest postwar communications project.

Designed as part of a nationwide network, the new cable eventually will provide additional long distance circuits and potential television facilities from coast to coast.

The Oregon portion of the coaxial project, including special equipment located in some 35 buildings constructed along the route, is expected to be ready for service sometime next summer.

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Boy Scouts Report Having Good Time At World Jamboree

Larry Henninger, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Henninger of Roseburg, and one of 1090 Boy Scouts from the United States now in France for the Sixth World Jamboree being held at Moisson, is having a grand and interesting time, according to letters received by his parents. Larry is a member of Troop 4 of Roseburg, sponsored by the Methodist Church.

The Oregon Trail Council, covering Lane, Benton, Douglas, Lincoln, Coos and Curry counties, is represented by four Scouts. Besides Henninger from Roseburg, there is Bob Furrer of Eugene, Robert Conklin of North Bend, and Alex Byler of Coos Bay. Letters received indicate that their voyage on the USAT General Muir was most interesting. The captain, who is of Swedish descent, "turned the ship over" to the boys, who stood all the various watches and patrols. "We travel at the rate of about 400 miles per day," wrote one of the Scouts "but we will be 11 hours late reaching Antwerp because the captain did his good turn today by answering an SOS from another ship which needed medical help. When we picked up the sick captain of the other ship, we also picked up 3 French stowaways." The ship docked at Antwerp on August 2.

One point all the boys agree on is that "the food is wonderful" not only on the train trip across country but also aboard ship. Victims of sea sickness were very few.

The Jamboree officially opened in Moisson on August 9 and concludes on the 18th. Carl Merryman, former Scoutmaster of this Council and resident of Corvallis, is in attendance. He has been in Italy for the past two years working with the rehabilitation program. No letters have been received as yet from the Scouts since the opening of the Jamboree.
