DDT Stops Beetles From Peach Punching

The little holes in the end of ripening peaches opposite the stem, which frequently give entrance to brown rot, are usually caused by the 11-spotted cucumber beetle, according to S. C. Jones, associate entomologist at the O. S. C. experiment station. Jones is author of a brief circular of information No. 414 which describes the beetle, the damage, and suggests control.

Addition of 3 per cent DDT to any sulfur dust used to control brown rot before harvest will control the beetle effectively, says Jones. One application is enough when applied at the rate of 45 pounds per acre 10 to 14 days before harvest begins.

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Research in Sheep Disease Offered

Those interested in the present status of research work on sheep diseases in Oregon will find a concise summary written by H. A. Lindgren, extension animal husbandman at O. S. C., and just issued as extension circular 495.

The circular discusses the more important diseases in Oregon and the work that has been done on them by the department of veterinary medicine of the experiment station. Names and numbers of various publications that give the results of research studies in more detail are also listed.

The diseases are taken up under two headings: parasitic diseases such as liver flukes and lung worms, and infectious diseases such as black disease, pulpy kidney, dysentery in lambs, rye-grass staggers and many others. One uncommon disease listed is called circling disease. Only recently the veterinary department isolated the cause of this trouble from the brain of a dog. This is said to be the first time that dogs have been incriminated as possible carriers of the disease. Treatments have proved ineffective to date.

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
