Urgent Need of Doctors, Nurses Cited by DAV

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Aug. 18.—(AP)—Vivian D. Corbly of Cincinnati, O., national adjutant of the Disabled American Veterans, asserted here that "a nationwide draft of doctors and nurses is as imperative now as it was during the war."

He told a news conference after arrival for the veterans national convention that World War 2 veterans are "jamming all available government hospital facilities, with thousands more on waiting lists" adding that "the doctor and nurse shortage in these hospitals is acute."

The DAV national commander, Lloyd F. Oleson of Ventura, Calif., said: "The hospital situation has reached the proportion of an emergency and we should take the same steps we took in wartime to meet it."

She was well known and affectionately called "Aunt Mary." She was a member of the Community Church of Oakland. Surviving are two sons and three daughters, George H. Chenoweth and J. Virgil Chenoweth, Oakland; Mrs. Ethel M. Armstrong, Loma, Mont.; Mrs. Rachel Bernstein, San Francisco, and Mrs. Ethelyn Kuenzley, Coquille, and two brothers, Robert Hall, Sutherlin, and George Hall, Oakland. Eight grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren also survive.

Services will be held in the Community Church, Tuesday at 2 P. M., with the Rev. James Brinks officiating. Vault interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Arrangements are in care of the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

Russians Don't Want War, Gen. Clark Says

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Gen. Mark W. Clark, former allied administrator in Austria and now commanding the Sixth Army in this area, says he doesn't think the Russians want war.

"If we can let them understand that we will not sacrifice our principles, I feel the chances of avoiding war will be much better," Gen. Clark told a civic gathering.

The question in Europe, Clark said, is "whether people will be permitted to have their own governments and run their own lives or whether they shall be dictated to by undemocratic rulers."

The general said he sees "a firm foreign policy" and universal military training as the United States' best safeguards for the future.
