Birthday parties have been held once a month for the men having birthdays during that month, and have added a homelike atmosphere. At these parties all the cake and ice cream the veteran wishes is provided for him and he is also presented with a special gift. If the veteran is unable to attend the party his gift is taken to him in the ward. The Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliaries presented to the veterans at the hospital a lovely Magnavox radio-phonograph as a Christmas gift. This is used each week at the classes in dance instruction which are sponsored by the auxiliaries. Through the courtesy of Bob's Music Shop a second radio-phonograph (table model) was presented to the Veterans to be used on the various wards for request programs, music appreciation, games, etc. Cigarettes and candy have been a regular treat to the veterans at the hospital. Bingo and ward parties have also been a part of the program. While the ex-service women were at the hospital many things were furnished for their comfort and recreation. ## Jo Ann Scoops First Sand For Reserve Armory

In a dedication of the Naval Reserve Armory at the county fairgrounds Sunday afternoon, "Miss Oregon" scooped the first shovelful of sand into the mixer, in which the Naval Reserve men immediately began making concrete for the foundations of their new building.

Jo Ann was welcome in a brief ceremony by Comm. Walter Mallory and was made an honorary member of Volunteer Naval Composite Division 13-1. "Your slightest command will be obeyed," she was told.

"Miss Oregon" was delivered to the scene of the dedication ceremony in a bright green convertible automobile driven by Del McKay. Her party included Congressman Harris Ellsworth, State Senator Tom Parkinson, Mayor Albert G. Flegel, and Jo Ann's mother, Mrs. Archie Amorde.

"This is a small part of the nation-wide program of preparedness," Comm. Mallory said. "We hope to turn out trained men, trained in Navy trades and incidentally, trained in civilian trades."

The invocation was given by the Rev. Morris H. Roach, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, who asked a blessing "in the ways of peace and prosperity."

An honor guard was provided by members of the Douglas County Sheriff's Posse. There were several spectators at the ceremony.

Immediately after Jo Ann placed the first shovelful of sand in the concrete mixer, members of the Naval Reserve unit set to work pouring concrete into the foundation forms which had been set up. They worked all afternoon.

## Slides Deal Death in Two Mexican Localities

TAMAZUNCHALE, Mex., Aug. 18.—(AP)—City officials reported today at least 10 known dead at Tamal, eight and one-half miles south of here, where a landslide Friday night wiped out 43 houses at the foot of a mountain peak on the Pan-American Highway.

Officials said another landslide on the heavily traveled highway at Villa Cerrada, 10 miles north, wiped out most of the houses in the tiny village and that two bodies had been recovered.

The two slides were caused by heavy rains which accompanied a weekend hurricane.

## Plan for Bryan Statue Arouses Ex-Governor

LINCOLN, Nebr., Aug. 18.—(AP) Former Governor Sam R. McKelvie said Saturday he will seek a court restraining order if necessary to prevent placing of a statue of William Jennings Bryan at the main entrance to the Nebraska statehouse.

"I hadn't heard a peep about this monstrous proposition until recently," said McKelvie, who was chairman of the original commission which planned the state building. "If I had realized what an outrage was afoot I surely would have spoken up long ago."

Bryan, known as the "silver-tongued orator of the Platte" in his days of public service, was a presidential candidate three times and served as secretary of state. He died 22 years ago.

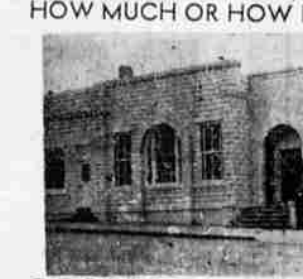
