

Roseburg Day Set At Josephine Fair At Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 19.—Southern Oregon's oldest county fair swung into high gear here today with announcement of several new events scheduled for its twenty-sixth annual observance August 29 through September 1.

Josephine County's fair promises to be replete with "firsts." For the first time in the fair's long history patrons will see fine Arabian thoroughbreds shown by breeder Lloyd Silva. The first open fly and bait casting contest, scheduled to become an annual event, will appeal to lovers of the finny tribes throughout this part of the country. For the first time in many years Avershire cattle will also be shown.

The fly casting contest will be

held Saturday afternoon, August 30th, under National Fly Casting Association rules open, without entry fee, to anyone wishing to compete.

Participating in Southern Oregon's largest and only county fair being held this year will be neighboring towns including Medford, Roseburg, Ashland, Rogue River, Cave City, Coos Bay and Gold Beach, among others.

Scheduled to appear from Medford will be the Sheriff's Posse and Eagles Junior Drum and Bugle Corps, with likely entrants being the High School Band and Drill Team. Roseburg will send its colorful Sheriff's Posse and the Paul Bunyan Club to compete in high jinks with the local Cavemen.

Sunday, Aug. 31, will be Roseburg day at the fair with a mammoth parade scheduled for 12:30 P. M. At 2 P. M. will be seen the huge rodeo including the same stock that will later appear at the Pendleton Roundup. At 8 P. M. a

free night show, similar to a circus without the tigers and elephants, will feature such events as trapeze artists, clowns, trained dogs and horses in front of the grandstand under lights.

U. S., Britain Ask Bulgaria to Halt Petkov Death Edict

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The United States and Britain yesterday urged Russia to instruct the Communist-dominated Bulgarian government to suspend a death sentence imposed on Nikola Petkov, opposition leader.

Petkov was sentenced Saturday at Sofia on charges of plotting to overthrow the Bulgarian regime and set himself up as leader of a new government.

The American and British appeals were made in letters to Lt. Gen. Cherepanov, Soviet acting deputy chairman of the Allied Control Commission for Bulgaria. The American letter, delivered by Maj. Gen. Walter M. Robertson, U. S. member of the commission, said Petkov's conviction "appears to be a gross miscarriage of justice."

The trial and sentence of the outspoken former leader of the opposition in parliament "may well have repercussions on peace and order in this country (Bulgaria) for which the Allied Control Commission has a specific responsibility," the letter added.

The State Department, making public the protest, said the British representative on the commission, Col. George Green, sent a similar letter to the Russian acting chairman.

Gen. Cherepanov was urged "to instruct" the Bulgarian government to suspend the sentence until the commission has full opportunity to review the case.

PILCHARD PRICE UPPED
ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 18.—(AP)—Despite heavy landings, pilchards advanced \$5 a ton in price here today to a total of \$45 a ton.

A fleet of 20 seiners, using planes as spotters, is working the pilchard schools. Landings at three Warrenton reduction plants already total 4500 tons. The total catch last year was 5000 tons.

Greek Guerrillas Reported Setting Up Own Regime

ATHENS, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Guerrilla fighters in Northern Greece were, by their own account, setting up people's courts in their territory today under a temporary military regime represented as the forerunner of a "provisional democratic government."

Their so-called "democratic army" said in a radio broadcast Sunday that these courts, of three members each under a people's commissar, would handle cases calling for sentences of up to five years' imprisonment, while military courts would handle more serious cases.

This report came from the same station that last Friday night broadcast that Communist Gen. Markos Vafiades, guerrilla commander, had taken up the administration of a "democratic government" from his headquarters until a provisional government could be formed with a "popular national assembly."

Neither broadcast indicated where the station nor the headquarters was located. Greek officials have said that the transmitter is in Tirana, capital of Albania, and one Greek source has reported Gen. Markos—as he is best known—to be based in Argirocastro, Albania, 70 miles south of Tirana and only 10 miles from Northwestern Greece.

Athens newspapers meanwhile reported that guerrillas beaten back before Grevena in the north-west July 27 by government troops, had captured two villages

and strategic heights in the Grammos and Smolikas mountains in a renewed attack.

Bloodless Surgery Clinic Dated Here This Week

Beginning this morning, a special clinic for examination and diagnosis is being held in the offices of Dr. R. L. Dunn in the Masonic building with Dr. Edward Milligan of Santa Ana, Calif., specialist in soft-tissue manipulations (known as bloodless surgery), in charge. Dr. Milligan has had years of experience in his work and will be here for three or four days. Appointments are all filled for the examination time and all other adjustment treatments have been called off for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in order to give full time to this special work.

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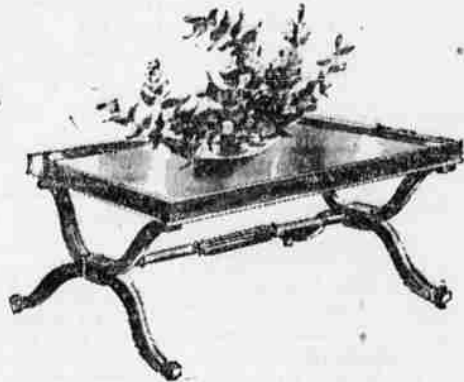
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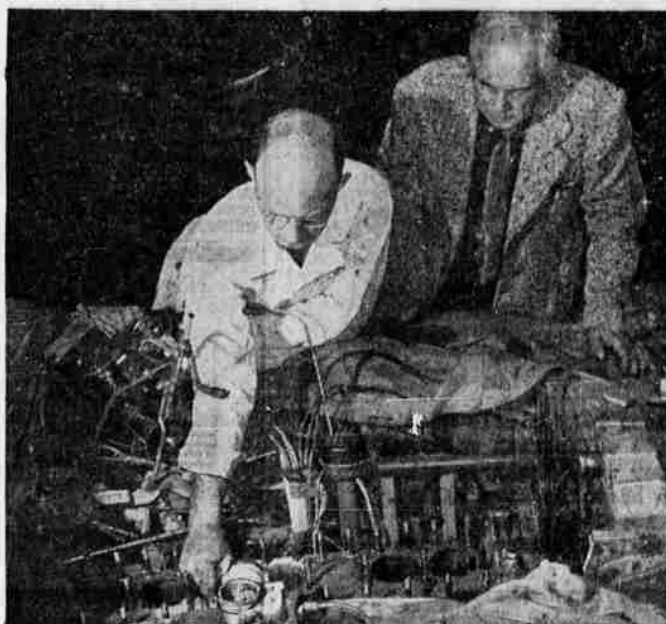
