G. O. P. Must Win Labor's Support, Warning of Morse

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20.—(P)—Senator Wayne Morse proposed a progressive rather than a conservative course for the Republican party in a speech here last night at the annual picnic of the state organization.

The Oregon senator said his party was in a state of dilemma which it must solve in the national convention next year, when the party leaders decide whether to follow the conservative program of the 1920's or adopt a progressive course that will win support of the labor vote.

"The Republican party cannot afford to carry the handicap of the present label which it bears, namely, that it is an anti-labor party. Republican leaders can kid themselves all they want to about our not being in bad with American labor. But the cold, hard political reality is that at this moment the rank and file working people in this country, as recent polls show, entertain the opinion that the best political interests of the workers is not to be found within the Republican party," Morse asserted.

He answered hints that he may be asked to join in a third party movement with a flat statement that he would have "no truck with leftists" and could only be interested in a third party if the Republican party became one dominated by reactionaries, monopoly and big business.

Morse said he noted rumors of possible opposition to his seeking a second term and said such efforts to intimidate him from opposing what he called "ultra-conservatives" would "not divert" him from his progressive action.
