Phone Finances Told at Hearing

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Approximately one-half of one per cent of the gross income of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company in Oregon, or \$307,097.37, was paid last year to the American Telephone & Telegraph Company under a license service contract, F. D. Tellwright, vice-president and general manager for the Oregon division of the Pacific Company, testified yesterday at a Public Utilities Commission hearing into application for a rate increase. Payments are based on revenue, but services from the American Company have increased through the years, Tellwright said.

The 1946 payment was more than double that of 1940, when \$138,025.09 of Oregon funds from the Pacific Company were turned over to the American Company. These payments did not include the Pacific Company's payments for a share in nationwide radio advertising, which last year amounted to more than \$10,000, and which went directly to an advertising agency, Tellwright testified.

Tellwright maintained, in cross examination by Assistant Attorney General Rex Kimmell, that annual savings from a portion of the license contract services received from American Telephone & Telegraph amounted to \$2,800,000, or nine times the amount of the 1946 payment.

'SPOTTERS' DROPPED

PORTLAND, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Five under-cover men of the State

Liquor Control Commission were dropped today, but Administrator William H. Hammond said there was no "shake-up."

The men were dropped because their names and faces had become known to bootleggers, Hammond said, adding that the under-cover detail has a rapid turnover.

Labor Act May Not End Inland Empire Strike

SPOKANE, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Two officials of the CIO Woodworkers of America predicted today that the Taft-Hartley act will have no effect on the Inland Empire lumber strike when it goes into effect Friday.

Both referred to the act's 65-day cooling-off provision and said that to the best of their knowledge this clause would affect only strikes called after Friday.

The Inland Empire strike affects 5,500 workers in North Idaho and Eastern Washington. Some have been on strike nine weeks in support of demands for wage increases to cut down the differentials between coast fir and inland pine operations. However, the larger part of the workers out on strike left their jobs only two weeks ago.

Seaman Sentenced to Die For Killing Shipmate

CRISTOBAL, Canal Zone, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Federal Judge Gardner yesterday sentenced Edward Kemp, 33, a Philadelphia seaman to be hanged in the Canal Zone penitentiary Dec. 15 for first degree murder.

Kemp was convicted of stabbing to death Joseph Mora, a shipmate on the U. S. freighter Andrew Jackson while the ship was anchored at this port. The prosecution said Kemp stabbed Mora in his sleep, wielding the knife through a porthole.

He said he was drinking on the fatal night and remembered nothing. The prosecution presented evidence of bitter rivalry between the men.

Robert Thomas, assistant Dis-

trict Attorney, said at the time of the trial that Kemp was on parole from a life term at the Walla Walla, Wash., penitentiary after conviction in 1938 on a second degree murder charge.
