The Pacific Coast league-leading Los Angeles Angels were slaughtered 21 to 8 last night by their own favorite weapon, the home run, as the power-laden Oakland team came to life with a bang in the sixth inning.

The Oaks hit seven home runs. One was with the sacks loaded in their big sixth inning in which nine runs crossed the plate. Haffey, pinch-hitting for shortstop Burnett, hit the grand slam walk-off home run. Crawford hit two homers apiece and Martin and Etten, the ex-Yankees, hit one each. The St. Louis Cardinals yesterday climbed back to defeat the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers 3-2. In 12 furiously fought innings and cut the Brooks' margin back to four and a half games. A home run smash by Kurowski, broke up the game.
