Legion Warned Against Errors Leading to War

SPOKANE, Aug. 22.—(P)—Mrs. Pearl A. Wanamaker, state superintendent of public instruction, told the 29th annual convention of the Washington Department of the American Legion today that the steps which led to World War II "can—and will—be repeated unless our education for freedom achieves its purpose."

"How well do we remember," she said, "the steps that almost imperceptibly but irrevocably led to World War II? The books burning in the market place at Salzburg; the synagogues empty and barred; the conscripted labor in Korea; the inflated currencies to buy bullets instead of butter; the scientific and medical research that must be directed toward the successful waging of war; the racial hatreds fostered between countries and nations."

"All of these led to murder—the murder of the individual human soul. And all of them led to sacrifice—the glorification of brute force as exemplified in the human dictator. Together they led to World War II. They can—and will—be repeated unless our education for freedom achieves its purpose."

Mrs. Wanamaker thanked the Legionnaires for the support she said the organization had given to efforts to raise salaries of teachers and provide other needs of education. She told them that "tax-supported public schools are the only means whereby education for freedom can be successfully accomplished."

Referring to teachers' strikes briefly, she said: "There can be no such thing as a 'successful' strike by teachers. For immediate gains won by individuals, the entire profession loses in stature. The public's confidence, hard won at best, gives way to suspicion, apathy or downright antagonism when teachers strike."

Cat Population Too Much for Neighborhood

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22.—(P)—Mrs. Eva Craft, to put it mildly likes cats.

So much so, in fact, her neighbors complained to the city Health Department when the total number of felines at her house, they said, reached 53.

Inspector Harry S. Smedley, Jr., investigated and reported the lost count before he got to 53. Mrs. Craft, 72-year-old widow,

said she didn't know how many there were—"I haven't counted recently."

Smedley said he would spare her felines—so long as they don't become a menace to public health.
