LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS TO HOLD SEVERAL CONFERENCES

The League of Women Voters of Roseburg have just been informed by the state president of the League of Women Voters of Oregon, Mrs. Blair Stewart of Portland, that a national staff of flier, Miss Bertha Pabst of Washington, D. C., will tour the west.

From the national president of Women Voters League of Washington, D. C., Anna Lord Strauss, comes the following information: "When the national council and board met in Washington in May, it was decided that the need to stimulate public discussion and citizen action on the problems of international trade was one of the most important tasks confronting the League of Women Voters. So that members may discuss the major aspects of this problem and explore together the methods that can be used to build an informed public opinion on the subject, a series of area conferences are being planned."

There will be nine such conferences scheduled in the United States. Conferences will be held in the following cities during the later part of September through October—Atlanta, Georgia; Kansas City, Missouri; Washington, D. C.; Minneapolis, Minnesota; Portland, Oregon; Dallas, Texas; Columbus, Ohio; New York, New York; and Los Angeles, California.

The conference in Portland will be held during October 15 and 16. Each conference is planned for a series of five sessions, covering a two-day period. At each there will be representatives of local leagues from several states and the state league boards. Each local league may send up to four representatives to whichever conference they consider most convenient as to time and place. The Roseburg league is most fortunate in being able to send representatives to a conference so near home.

The Jolly Circle Club will meet Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. J. B. Follen. All members are most cordially invited to be present.

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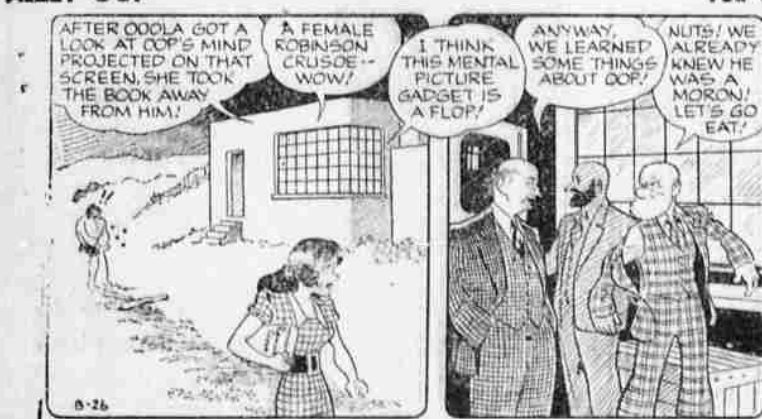
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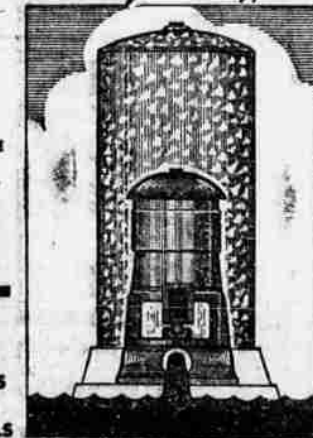
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
