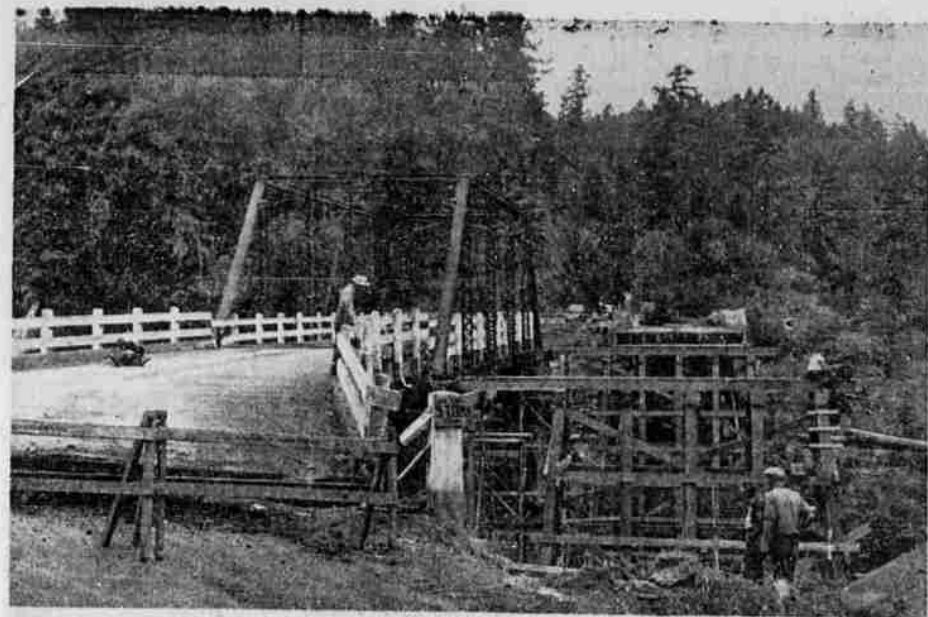

'Tame' Atomic Bomb Devised by Commission

LOS ALAMOS, N. M., Aug. 29. —(AP) —The development of a "tame" atomic bomb for research into ways to get useful power from nuclear fission was announced today by the Atomic Energy Commission.

Instead of a devastating blast, the toned-down bomb produces a steady output of fast neutrons, needed for experiments to determine what kind of chain reaction is best for practical power purposes.

It is a new type of chain reaction plant or "pile" utilizing high energy neutrons for atomic fission of plutonium. The commission's announcement described it as in a sense "a controlled version of the atomic bomb itself."

Egyptians Stage Fresh Riot Over U. N. Delay

CAIRO, Aug. 29. —(AP) —Police swinging clubs battled demonstrators marching through the streets of Cairo today shouting "revolt, down with imperialism, long live our brothers the policemen."

Two persons were reported wounded slightly by police fire. The demonstration was a new protest of the fact that the United Nations Security Council had not ordered British troops from the Nile valley, as Egypt demanded. Three persons were reported killed in a similar riot last week.

The demonstrators finally left the streets, many to sleep during the hot afternoon to be ready for renewed activity tonight should the U. N. reject the Egyptian demand.

New Twins Hike Brood to 16 in Six-Room House

NORTH ADAMS, Mass., Aug. 29. —(AP) —The arrival of twin boys at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edward J. Lescaubeau increased their brood to 16 in 18 years, and, incidentally, their housing problem.

The twins were the second set in the family in six years. The ages of the other children range from two to 17.

Mrs. Lescaubeau said it would be a problem finding room accommodations for the new arrivals in their six-room tenement. But she wasn't a bit discouraged. She said she hoped they'd have more.

Dispute Arises Between U. S. Envoys in Greece

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. —(AP) —A top State Department policy official headed for Greece today to straighten out a conflict of authority—if such a conflict exists—between Ambassador Lincoln MacVeagh and Dwight Griswold, head of the American Aid Mission.

Loy Henderson, chief of the department's division of Near Eastern Affairs, left by plane following reports from Athens that MacVeagh and Griswold were not in complete accord concerning the Greek cabinet crisis.

Registration Scheduled Next Week for City School Pupils; Hot Lunch Prices Unchanged

Registration of Junior and Senior High School pupils will begin Wednesday, Sept. 3, between the hours 9 A. M. and 4 P. M., and will continue through Friday afternoon at the two schools.

Freshmen will register at the Senior High Sept. 3; sophomores, Sept. 4, and seniors, Sept. 5. For those pupils who work and cannot come during the day, registration for all pupils both in the Senior and Junior High School will be between the hours of 7 and 9 P. M. on Thursday.

Relief of Burden on Taxpayers, Benefit to All Europe Intended

BERLIN, Aug. 29. —(AP) —A Western Germany with an industrial capacity about equal to 1936 was envisaged today by the United States and Great Britain in a new level-of-industry plan providing for annual steel production of 19,700,000 ingot tons.

Under the plan, the U. S. and British zones, to relieve the burden on American and British taxpayers, would produce 15 per cent more exports than the same areas did in 1936—three years before Germany started World War II—to bring in \$2,000,000,000 a year.

The new plan was a revision of the four-power level-of-industry and reparations agreement of March, 1946. In announcing it, the U. S. and British military governors—Gen. Lucius D. Clay and Air Chief Marshal Sir Sholto Douglas—termed the new ceiling set in that agreement "unrealistic."

Under the four-power plan, the steel ceiling for all Germany was 5,800,000 tons. Under the British-American plan, the British and U. S. zones alone would produce

Wool Being Accepted Under Federal Program

Wool shipments under the government wool purchase program are being accepted by the Pacific Wool Growers Association, it was reported by McKinley Huntington, representative of the association at Yoncalla.

Wool legislation provides that the average price to be paid to wool producers be in line with the 1946 support price. The latter was slightly more than 42 cents per pound, grease basis, throughout the United States.

Pacific Wool Growers is making the maximum advance permitted by the Commodity Credit Corporation for wools this year—40 cents per pound. Balance of the price due the producer will be paid when wools are cleaned and graded.

Malheur Waging Fight On Epidemic of Polio

ONTARIO, Ore., Aug. 29. —(AP) —A fight to stem the westward sweep of an Idaho infantile paralysis epidemic was being waged today in Malheur County.

Five already have been stricken in this southeastern Oregon county, joining Idaho's western boundary, and six other persons are under observation.

All public gatherings were under suspicion. The county fair was canceled and the opening of school was set back to Sept. 15.

Dr. A. L. Maulding of the State Board of Health urged parents to keep children at home. He also asked theaters to refuse admittance to youngsters and churches to keep children away from large gatherings.

DDT was sprayed by airplane over the area. A four-man polo team was due here from Portland to combat the disease.

Idaho has had 88 cases, most of them in the southwestern part of the state.

Posse Seeks Ex-Convict For Slaying Banker

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 29. —(CP) —Hunted like a wild animal in a bush-covered Surrey district, Walter Pavlukoff, 35-year-old ex-convict sought for the slaying of a bank manager here, was believed to be making a last desperate bid today to reach the international border.

Men and bloodhounds beat through the dense bush as police reinforcements joined the search during the morning.

Police dogs from the state reformatory at Munro, Wash., are aiding in the hunt for Pavlukoff, sought on a murder warrant issued 24-hours after the fatal shooting Monday of Sydney S. Petrie, 55, who died half an hour after an attempted holdup at the Broadway Branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce here.

Two Hitchhikers Sought In Double Slaying, Theft

OMAHA, Aug. 29. —(AP) —Two khaki-clad hitchhikers were sought today in the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. May, 2nd, prominent Arlington, Va., couple whose return from a Colorado vacation ended here in death by gunshot.

The young couple, whose bodies were found in blood-spattered bushes on Omaha's far western outskirts yesterday, are believed to have picked up the hitchhikers at Grand Island, Neb., about 150 miles west of here.

Their fully-clothed bodies, both with revolver shots through the head, were found early yesterday by two small boys investigating bloodstains along the highway. Their money was gone and there apparently had been an attempt to remove all identification.

Oregon Alpinist Killed In Fall on Teton Range

JACKSON, Wyo., Aug. 29. —(AP) —William McIndoe, Jr., 22, of Portland, Ore., fell to his death sometime early Sunday morning when he attempted to scale lofty 12,922-foot Mt. Owen in the Teton range in Western Wyoming.

The accident was not witnessed. McIndoe was attempting to climb the peak alone. He had gone several hundred feet up the side of the rugged peak, second only to the Grand Teton in height in the range, when he apparently lost his footing and fell to his death.

Congressman Springer Of Indiana Passes Away

CONNERSVILLE, Ind., Aug. 29. —(AP) —Raymond S. Springer, 65, Republican representative from the tenth Indiana district since 1938 and twice the Republican nominee for governor of Indiana, died last night.

U. S. Acts for Korean Freedom

Further Delay Intolerable, Russians Told

Four-Power Conference To Speed Plan Agreed on In 1945 Urged at Once

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. —(AP) —The United States called today for a four-power conference to speed Korean independence.

The request was made in a new note to Moscow saying that the present deadlock on a joint Russian-American commission to arrange for a provisional government can not, in this country's opinion, continue.

"The United States government can not in good conscience be a party to any such delay in the fulfillment of its commitment to Korean independence and proposes that the four powers adhering to the Moscow agreement meet to consider how that agreement may be speedily carried out," the note said.

It suggested that conversations on the problem begin Sept. 8. Nations participating in the Moscow conference on Korea were the United States, Britain, Russia and China.

Simultaneously, the State Department disclosed a summary of proposals by this country for Korea's future.

Russia Opposes Vote

They included the American suggestion for a general Korean election which has been rejected by Russia.

The U. S. note said the Soviet claim that it has the right to exclude some Korean political parties from participating in the decisions on Korea's future is "contrary to the democratic principle of freedom of opinion."

"For almost two years the government of the United States has devoted its utmost efforts to carrying out the terms of the Moscow agreement on Korea," the note said.

The agreement to which it referred was reached in connection with a meeting of the Big Three foreign ministers in Moscow in December, 1945. At that time it

Ouster of Dogs Enrages Army Wives in Japan

TOKYO, Aug. 29. —(AP) —Occupation wives, irate over Army orders to give their dogs, canaries and other pets out of Army apartments and billets, plan to pour their troubles into the ears of a group of congressmen expected to visit Japan shortly.

"And we have a lot more things than just this pet business to tell them about," said Mrs. Anne Coon of New York, wife of an Army lieutenant.

Mrs. Coon declared that she had ignored the deadline of noon today and that her dog is still in her apartment. She said she had no intention of ousting the canine and would stick it out until the congressmen showed up.

Twenty wives stormed an Army command office yesterday to protest the order. The Army said the eviction of pets was necessary for sanitary reasons and because other tenants complained.

Salem Woman Killed in Norwegian Plane Crash

OSLOW, Norway, Aug. 29. —(AP) —An American passenger who died with 34 other persons yesterday in the crash of a Norwegian Airlines flying boat was identified today as Mrs. Hardecka Margrete Jess, 67, of Salem, Ore.

Mrs. Jess, a widow, recently visited her birthplace, and was returning to Bodø, Norway, to see relatives. The flying boat on which she, 26 other passengers and eight crewmen were killed crashed in fog and rain in the Lofoten mountains.

Crash Kills Woman; Roseburg Trucker Unhurt

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 29. —(AP) —C. May Morality, retired Portland school teacher, was killed and her traveling companion, Mrs. Bernard Hertziger, also of Portland, was critically injured in a traffic accident near Jefferson late last night.

State police reported that the car in which the two women were returning from a visit to Grants Pass, collided with a truck driven by Rex Roberts, Roseburg, who was uninjured.

Mrs. Hertziger was brought to Albany general hospital.

Eisenhower Sees No Threat Of Global War Now but Tells United States to be Prepared

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. —(AP) —General of the Army Dwight D. Eisenhower, Army chief of staff, told American Legionnaires today he saw no immediate threat of a global war but added that United States armed forces should be strong enough to make an aggressor realize war would "likely be fought over his territory."

Legion Auxiliary Names New Head

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. —(AP) —The American Legion Auxiliary nominated today an unopposed slate of candidates for national officers, headed by Mrs. Lee W. Hutton, of Excelsior, Minn., for president.

Election of officers will be held Sunday.

Mrs. Hutton has been a member of the auxiliary for 26 years. Her husband, an Excelsior post-office employee, was a lieutenant in the Army Air Corps in the First World War.

SALEM, Aug. 29. —(AP) —The Legislative Interim Committee to study state highway needs agreed today to hold a series of public hearings over the state.

R. H. Baldeck, state highway engineer, recommended the hearings as a means of informing the public about the need for an expanded highway program, and to learn about the need for better county roads and city streets.

Jap Prison Head Doomed To Hang; 2 Others Raped

YOKOHAMA, Aug. 29. —(AP) —Death by hanging was ordered for one Japanese and long prison terms were meted to two others for contributing to the deaths of 42 allied prisoners, including one Oregonian, at Mitsuhashi prison camp.

Sgt. Major Michishita drew the death penalty from a military commission. He was charged with contributing to all 42 deaths by beatings and compelling ill prisoners to perform hard labor.

A life term was given Mineo Nomura, a civilian guard known as "Big Speedo," for contributing to 28 deaths by beatings and a medical sergeant, Shichinobu Shichio, drew 25 years for failure to restrain those under him from forcing ill prisoners to work.

The list of prisoners who died included Alfred G. Smith, Klamath Falls.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. —(AP) —President Truman today named six new members to the War Relocation Authority, as undersecretary of war and announced his choice of five others for key positions in the new unified defense setup.

Coal Miners In England Strike

LONDON, Aug. 29. —(AP) —At least 11 mines normally employing 25,180 men and producing 154,000 weekly tons of critically needed coal were idle today because of wildcat strikes which threatened to spread in the Yorkshire coal field.

More than 25,000 men quit in sympathy with 140 who walked out Aug. 11 in protest to a joint-Union-National Coal Board Committee ruling assigning them two additional feet of coal to mine.

The National Coal Board, which has administered British coal mines since the labor government nationalized them Jan. 1, dismissed the original strikers, ruling the men terminated their contracts by refusing to return to work last Monday.

Faced with the necessity of getting more coal mined to prevent a repetition of last winter's fuel famine, the labor union of Mine Workers has appealed to strikers to return.

At Grimethorpe mine, where the unauthorized strike began, a crude white gallows was erected and inscribed: "Burn Will Lawther."

Lawther, president of the National Union of Mineworkers, supported the coal board in firing the strikers and said the board "would have been lacking in its duty" had it done otherwise.

The conservative Daily Graphic demanded bitterly that the labor government reduce the extra rations allotted coal miners.

Will Repays Kindness To Immigrant Woman

KANSAS CITY, Kas., Aug. 29. —(AP) —More than 30 years ago Fred Haynes, a railroad man, befriended a young woman immigrant from Austria by helping her with financial problems in a restaurant she operated.

Today Haynes had an \$18,000 legacy because of his "loyal friendship and services."

Mrs. Katy Grisknik, the immigrant, made out a will leaving Haynes \$18,000 last Sunday. She died Tuesday at the age of 52.

Haynes, now a deputy in the county clerk's office, said he was an early customer in Mrs. Grisknik's restaurant and helped her with tax and banking problems since she could not read or write English.

Snell Urges Vets to Keep Bonds Until Maturity

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 29. —(AP) —Governor Earl Snell today urged veterans to keep their armed forces leave bonds until maturity, unless they absolutely need the cash.

The governor pointed out that by keeping the bonds, veterans can get 2 1/2 per cent interest for five years. Next Tuesday will be the first day for cashing the bonds.

Proposed Inclusion in Roseburg, Bond Issue May Ultimately Go to Vote

Solution to the sewage disposal problem in Roseburg's fringe areas by annexation to the city, was favored by an overwhelming majority of more than 50 Riverside and Nebovista residents, who attended a special meeting in the City Hall last night.

The meeting, presided over by County Sanitarian Claude Baker, was called in behalf of the unofficial committee which has been promoting the creation of the Edenbower Sanitary District. Residents of Nebovista (Cootes Addition) attended because of their own acute problem.

After more than two hours of discussion, John D. Todd was elected the chairman of a committee to investigate the possibility of annexation to the City of Roseburg of the immediate suburban areas.

Todd's committee includes Herbert Wood, M. W. Slankard, Norman Sieffarth, Jack Doyle, "Doc" Carter, the Rev. Walter A. MacArthur, Dr. E. J. Wainwright, Harry O. Paragetter and Edward Murphy. Todd set next Thursday evening as the date for the committee's first meeting.

Attending last night's session were Kenneth H. Spies and T. M. Gerow, sanitary engineers for the State Department of Health.

Court Ruling Needed

Present delay in the formation of the Edenbower Sanitary District, the boundaries of which have already been approved, is caused by the question of the legality of a bond issue, Todd explained.

No sanitary district in the state has ever issued bonds under a recent law permitting them to do so, he continued. Until such legality is established by a State Supreme Court ruling, neither the U. S. National Bank nor the First National Bank of Portland

One solicitor said she represented "relief beneficiaries and old age groups." The America Pension Committee and the Townsend Club said they were not involved.

Clothing allowances were eliminated this summer by what the welfare commission said was lack of funds. The allowances since have been restored.

Smallest Turkey Crop Since 1938 Forecast

PORTLAND, Aug. 29. —(AP) —A turkey crop 20 per cent under last season's and the smallest since 1938—that's the forecast for Oregon turkey growers this year.

The Department of Agriculture estimated the total at 1,639,000 birds, slightly larger than indicated earlier in the season. The department added that a market shortage was not expected.
