## Livestock Tour Made by 4-H'ers Of Three Counties

Four-H club members from Coos, Curry and Douglas counties attended a Southern Coast livestock tour Friday and Saturday last week. Donald Olivanti and Larry Bolling of Lookingglass, Donald Nicklason and Dennis Johnston of Olalla; Glenn Jones, Camas Valley, and Kenneth Minnick, county club agent, attended from Douglas County. First stop on the tour was at the J. H. Bennett ranch near Coos Bay, where Bennett explained his hog feeding operations and club members judged three classes of swine. Next stop was at Peterson Brothers Ranch at Arago. Two classes of beef cattle were judged there. Jack Hansel, assistant Coos County agent, showed members over the Ray Bates cranberry bog at Bandon. The construction of cranberry bogs was explained by Bates as well as harvesting methods. Bates told the fifty club members on the tour that it takes four years to get a cranberry bog into production.

On Saturday the club members were shown over the gorse control area. Next stop was at the farm of Walter Halseth, where club members judged pure bred Romney sheep. The final two stops were at Jersey cattle farms, both of which have more than doubled butter fat production through 4-H club projects and selection of better animals and pasture improvement.

The first Jersey farm visited was that of Ralph Cope, where butterfat production over a 10-year period was increased from 390 pounds average per cow up to 600 per cow. At the Cadman ranch, the final stop on the tour, Sidney Cadman, a former 4-H boy, told club members how they had increased the average production per cow from 190 pounds per cow to 499 per cow average in 1946 through their 4-H projects and through better animal selection and pasture improvement.

## Federal Limit On Farm Aid Advised

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(P)—The National Association of Real Estate Boards yesterday said real estate men of the nation "are outraged" at the anti-trust indictment returned by a federal grand jury against the association and Washington Real Estate Board.

The association, promising to "fight this indictment," made its views known in a statement issued through Morgan L. Fitch of Chicago, NAREB president. It said the charges are "a sad commentary upon the present status of law enforcement in this country."

The indictment returned by a grand jury here accused the NAREB and the Washington Board of conspiring to fix commission rates on property deals in the District of Columbia. The indictment also said the alleged conspiracy eliminated competition among real estate dealers here.

The grand jury investigation, expected to reach into many states, began after Attorney General Clark ordered the Justice Department's anti-trust division to act against any conspiracies to boost housing, clothing and food prices.

Persecution Implied Fitch's statement said the NAREB has "frankly told the administration and Congress what we believe should be done concerning housing in the public interest. It seems an outrage that we can not do this without danger of reprisals."

terest in the matter of housing at times in opposition to the administration. "Apparently the time has come when a citizen of this country can not speak out without being served notice that he does so at the peril of criminal prosecution. This is a sad commentary upon the present status of law enforcement in this country."

**Try to Protect Public** The NAREB statement continued: "It seems significant to many realtors that this indictment sought by the Department of Justice should have come at this particular moment. The National Association of Real Estate Boards and realtors have for a long time been seeking to protect property owners and home owners by opposing certain types of federal legislation designed to maintain indefinitely and permanently the controls of government over the homes and property of the nation.

"In view of the charges brought against this association, it is apparent that nationwide demands by veterans' groups, public bodies and government agencies for collaboration among the various elements in the housing industry in order to produce better communities and lower costs would subject any participants to criminal charges by the Department of Justice."
