Police to Enforce In Curfew Enforcement

Children returning home from theaters, parties, or other recreation will not be arrested by the police the moment the clock strikes 10, under the 10 o'clock curfew law, Chief of Police O. A. Kennerly explains.

The police have received several inquiries from children who are afraid that they will be picked up by patrolmen if they are seen proceeding home at a late hour.

"They're not the ones we're after. We don't want to make cop haters out of them," the chief said. "It's the ones who are already cop haters, who habitually loiter around hotel lobbies and restaurants and taverns, or about the streets, we want to question."

"We don't want the kids to get the idea that we're looking down their necks every minute," he added.

The chief pointed out that his night patrolmen know the persons who are abroad at late hours for legitimate reasons and those who are merely loiterers in public places.

Auto Costs to be Slashed by Use of Powdered Iron

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—

(AP)—Powdered iron, product of the cheap and abundant electric power of the Pacific Northwest, will help reduce the cost of automobiles.

One of the Far West's new industries, the Tacoma Powdered Metals Co., is turning out the product at the rate of 10 tons daily at its new plant in Tacoma.

Use of this material can reduce the cost of a machine tooled part for an automobile from \$5 to \$6 to only 15 or 20 cents says Pacific Factory, plant management magazine, in its August issue.

Jacob Schoder, vice president and plant manager, is quoted as saying the product is being turned out at a competitive manufacturing cost, including transportation to eastern markets.

The powdered iron is manufactured by a new electrolytic process using large quantities of electricity. This process employs a combination of chemical operations and electrolysis. Other methods of reducing scrap iron to the powdered state involve the use of chemical processes, either partially or wholly.

Raw materials needed, an abundance of which are to be found in the Tacoma area, include scrap iron or steel borings and turnings, hydrochloric acid and hydrogen.

The powdered iron, packed and sealed in airtight containers to prevent rust, is shipped to plants in the Detroit-Cleveland area that are equipped to use it.

Local Banks Prepare for Terminal Bonds Cashing

Both local banks, expecting a heavy cashing of terminal leave bonds when the institutions open for business Tuesday, September 2, after the Labor Day holiday, announced they are making plans to provide a special service for the veterans.

A bond-cashing window probably will be designated in each institution. It will be the first banking day on which the new law goes into effect.

Bankers advise holders of bonds not to cash them unless funds are really needed but to hold them as an emergency resource, pointing out that they will draw two and one half per cent interest.

The pigeon season closes Sept. 30. The dove season, with a daily bag limit of 10, will run from Sept. 1 to 15 in Lake, Klamath, Deschutes, Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Crook, Wasco, Sherman, Jefferson, Hood River, Wheeler, Gilliam and Morrow counties.
