On account of Mr. Rand's recent illness, only the immediate family attended the celebration Monday and the family reunion held the preceding day, at which time Mr. Rand celebrated his seventy-fifth birthday.

Mr. Rand was born August 24, 1872, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Clay Rand, early residents of Roseburg and Rice Creek near Dillard.
