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Cardinals Rally
In 9th Inning to
Defeat Brooklyn

The Cardinals outplayed the Dodgers once again today as they still breathing St. Louis club showed the baseball world that they do not intend to relinquish their crown without a last ditch struggle.

The Redbirds' nerve-rattling 8-7 "saver" victory over the Dodgers last night rescued them from practical elimination.

So once again the Cards are four and a half games in back of front running Brooklyn, but this time they have only 17 games left to play while the Dodgers have 14.

Yesterday not many of the wild-eyed onlookers that packed Sportsman's park in St. Louis would have given a plugged nickel for the Cards' chances as they trudged in from the field for their turn at bat in the last of the ninth.

They went to work on Behrman, fifth Dodger hurler, in earnest, driving him off the mound and gave the coup de grace to Branca, Brooklyn ace, a two-run double by Slaughter.

The win squared the vital three-game series at one win apiece and put the issue directly up to Lombardi, Dodger left-hander and Dickson, St. Louis righthander, who oppose each other in this afternoon's rubber game.

The New York Yankees, apparently just playing out their string, were beaten again for their eighth loss in the last 13 starts, when they bowed to the Detroit Tigers, 7-2.

Open Seasons on
Game Announced

"Open seasons" for various game, as announced last summer by the Oregon game commission for this state, follows:

Deer—Oct. 1 to 20, inclusive, in entire state except Sherman county and certain other enclosures that may be announced. Bag limit is one blacktail or mule deer having at least forked horns.

Antelope—No open season.
Elk—(Western Oregon) Oct. 25 to Nov. 2, inclusive, for bull elk having antlers with three or more points, including the brow tine, in Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln and Lane counties and parts of Clatsop and Douglas counties.

Elk—(Eastern Oregon) Oct. 25 to Nov. 16, inclusive, for bull elk having antlers with three or more points, including the brow tine, in the area east of the Dalles-California highway and including all of Deschutes county. A section of Baker county will be open for elk hunting from November 22 to 30, inclusive.

Thesants—Oct. 22 to Nov. 2 in Douglas, Klamath, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Union and Lake, except Summer Lake Valley is closed during regular season. Open season Oct. 22 to Nov. 2 in Malheur county. No season in Willamette valley counties. Bag limit—Three cocks a day and not more than six in possession.

Valley Quail—Open season with pheasant season in Coos, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Grant, Harney, Lake and Jefferson counties. Bag limit—Five quail a day, 10 in possession.

Blue Grouse—Oct. 1 to 20 in Josephine, Clatsop, Columbia and those counties west of the summit of the coast range. Bag limit—Two grouse a day but not more than four during the entire season.

I wish to announce my retirement from general, active practice of medicine and surgery, effective September 14, 1947.

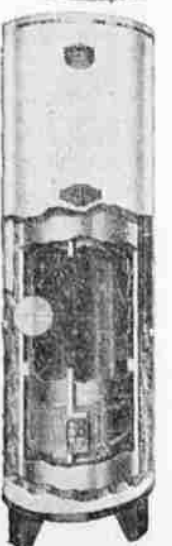

Los Angeles and second-place San Francisco maintained their neck and neck pace today in the Pacific Coast League pennant run.

The Angels had little difficulty in swatting out a 17-to-9 win over Sacramento last night to lead their series three games to one. For the Seals it required a ninth inning rally to edge out the last-place San Diego Padres, 5 to 4, and make it four straight wins.

In beating the Solons the Angels kept their 13 game margin over San Francisco. Los Angeles went after the Sac's fast, scoring nine runs in the first inning. Dohernie relieved Angel Pitcher Chambers in the fourth and was credited with the win. Chambers, the loop's leading winner, was off his game and gave up four hits and eight walks. Cecil, one of four Solon pitchers used in the game, was charged with the loss.

San Francisco was trailing San Diego 4 to 3 going into the ninth. Then San Diego's Tran muffed Trower's grounder to load the bases after Luby and Taormina had walked. Matheson's long fly

sent Luby home. The bases were loaded again on a walk and Roselli socked a Texas leaguer to drive in Taormina for the winning marker.

Portland, in third place four games behind the Angels, broke a 7-7 tie in the ninth to beat Hollywood, 8 to 7, and increase their series edge to three games to one. Pinch Hitter Mullen banged a single with the bases loaded in the ninth to drive home the winning run. Mooty, who relieved Jack Salveson in the seventh, was the winning pitcher while Romple, Hollywood's fourth hurler, was nipped for the defeat.
