WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The engineering chief for the nation's major builder of jet engines said today that the United States has "at least caught up with and in some ways is ahead" of the British in jet propulsion.

STARTING A SWIMMING POOL

The Roseburg school district board, however, recently proposed to the Commission that the pool be located on school property and has offered a location at the east end of Finlay Field. The offer has been accepted because the new location is considered much more convenient.

But with the concrete tank constructed, other units can be added from time to time, until finally the pool can be put into use. Whether the job is completed next year or five years from now depends entirely upon how rapidly money is made available to finish construction.

Total cost involved in units necessary to put the pool into operation is estimated at approximately \$125,000, of which \$47,000 now is available. The Commission proposes a "Tag day" in which the public will be asked to buy tags, each representing a sack of cement to be used in construction. It has been suggested that various clubs and organizations sponsor revenue producing programs to benefit the swimming pool fund.

Roseburg residents have long been demanding a swimming pool. Money on hand is from \$70,000 to \$80,000 less than needed to complete the task. Local enthusiasm doubtless will be increased when work actually gets under way. If this enthusiasm is sufficient to produce the additional money needed to complete the job, there need be no recess in construction. If, on the other hand, the Commission is forced to stop the job with nothing more than a concrete tank, unusable because other necessary units cannot be financed, it will have discharged its responsibility to the public, and cannot be further criticized for delaying the pool. The responsibility then passes to the general public to raise the balance of funds needed.

We believe Roseburg wants the pool strongly enough to finance it, once building actually is begun. Maybe we're wrong. We should have the answer soon.
